RESERVOIR UNDER WAY GOOD START HAS BEEN MADE ON WORK

Good progress is being made on the new water reservoir work on the butte, according to Carl A. McClain, superintendent of the city water and light department, although the contractors have but fairly started.

Considerable blasting has to be

done, but little more than skimming off the surface has been accomplished, it was stated. The contractors have about all their equipment on the ground.

A. D. Kern and company of Portland, who have the contract for the new pipe line from Hayden's bridge to the city pumping plant, have not yet made a start on the work. The company is having machinery made in the East and a start will be made when it arrives, it is stated.

FOREIGN DEBATE TEAM COMING HERE IN APRIL

University of Sydney Has
Oregon Meet Scheduled

VARSITY SCHEDULE GIVEN

New System to Be Used By University Squad During Coming Year, Coach Announces

The University of Sydney, Australia, will send a two-man debate team to Eugene some time during the month of April to meet the University of Oregon debaters. It was announced at the university last night.

The exact date of the meet here is not known. It is stated, as the Sydney team is to arrive in San Francisco April 6, but will appear in several debates with various university and college teams on the Pacific coast during its trip.

The invitation to meet the foreign university was received here yesterday at the executive secretary's office and the proposed plan was enthusiastically received by the administration and the forensics group.

Also a new style of debating, to be known as the "Oregon plan," is to be used this year for the first time by Oregon teams, according to an announcement by J. Stanley Gray, head of the department of public speaking and debate coach, who is sponsoring the plan.

New Plan Outlined
Under this plan the first speakers of the affirmative and negative

sides are allowed 10 minutes in which to give constructive argument. The second speakers will then cross-question the opposing first speaker for an equal period. Each of the second speakers will then give a 10-minute rebuttal and summary of the argument of his side. However, no decision will be made by judges under this style of debating, it is stated.

"The great benefit of such international debates," Mr. Gray says, "is that it forms a combination of the witty style of foreign students with the more thorough and serious but less interesting style of American contestants. It also helps to develop new styles of debating such as Oregon is to use this year."

Schedule Given
This debate with the University of Sydney will end the Oregon season for this year.

The debate schedule as announced follows:

January 26—Freshman women versus Eugene Bible university.

February 26—University of Oregon versus University of Washington and Idaho, triangular.

March 4—Freshman men versus O. A. C. rook team.

March 8—University of Oregon versus University of Southern California (by radio).

March 12—State old line oratory contest at Corvallis.

April 8, 9, 10—Pacific Coast forensics league conference, oratory and extempore contest, Pullman, Washington.

JUNIOR HIGH TESTS TO BE
JANUARY 19, 20

Enrollment of Students to Be Carried on Without Formality; Plans Discussed

Examination dates for the Woodrow Wilson and Theodore Roosevelt junior high schools were set yesterday at a meeting of the principals of the two schools with Superintendent David John Jones.

The tests, which incidentally will close the term for the junior high school students, will be held on Tuesday and Wednesday, January 19 and 20. Papers will be corrected Thursday and there will be practically no class work that day. Students will return Friday and get their grade cards.

Enrollment will be carried out without much formality and both faculties will be ready for the opening of the next term January 25, it was said.

Other matters for the government of the junior high schools were discussed and will be taken before a meeting of the teachers next Wednesday and then referred back to the board of education. These problems include courses and schedules to be followed.

FORMER REGISTER EMPLOYE
WILL BE BROUGHT BACK

Charge Against Him Is Larceny by
Bullock; Bigamy Charge
Not Pressed

Damon A. Lewis, who, until about the middle of October had been employed for a number of months as rural circulation agent of the Morning Register, was arrested at Seattle Tuesday night on a charge of larceny by bullock of an automobile. The complaint was made out in the Cottage Grove justice court where, it is alleged, he contracted to buy a car and making small payments upon it, left the state.

Lewis was married at Marcola soon after he left here October 12 to a Florence girl on a license issued at Albany, and it is alleged that he left a wife in Eugene. It is stated that the girl has since left him and returned to her home at Florence.

Extradition papers will be secured, according to Sheriff Taylor and Lewis will soon be brought back. As far as known no complaint has been filed against him for alleged bigamy.
