

HIGH SCHOOLS GAINING

PROF. HOMER P. RAINEY TALKS TO P. T. A.

Satisfaction Point Far Off Yet, Despite Added Interest in Higher Education

That a great increase had been attained in the enrollment of students in the high schools of the country in the last 25 years, but that the situation was yet a long way from the saturation point, was the statement made at the meeting of the Eugene high school Parent-Teacher association at the high school yesterday by Professor Homer P. Rainey of the University of Oregon.

Oregon has shared much of this increase, said the speaker, and has enjoyed in the last few years approximately a 700 per cent increase. With the added numbers of students from grade schools taking up the high school courses, there has been an enormous expansion of curriculum in recent years also, he added. High school courses now are planned to fit the students for vocations.

One of the outstanding problems of the recent time is to prepare the high school student to meet the demands of life," he said. There are three types of work, classical, commercial and technical. One of the studies of education has been the correlation of high school work with that of the lower and the high institutions, and the adjustment of the curriculum to meet the needs of the student and the community.

"Our high schools have not yet reached the height of enrollment based on the population and have considerable distance to go before reaching the saturation point," said Dr. Rainey, inferring that the grade schools had reached that point. Each year, however, showed more desire on the part of older boys and girls to attend high schools.

The speaker concluded by referring also to politics and said that the public education should not be made a political issue. Only a short music program was given at the meeting which was attended by approximately 100 persons. The high school girls' glee club quartet composed of Anna Garrett, Evelyn Hollis, Virginia Reed and Kathleen Powell, sang a few selections. Refreshments were served at the conclusion of the meeting.
