urged to send the circulars with letters mailed to other places. The land offered to manufacturers is the railroad site leased by the city from Eugene. The tract comprises almost 250 acres and is described in the circular as level with access to railroad, water and electric power facilities.

In describing Lane county, the circular says that there is 60,000,000 feet of timber in the county, half of which is immediately adjacent to Springfield. The county is also renowned for its dairying, fruit growing and other agricultural industries, it is stated.

A number of industrial plants are already situated in Springfield, the committee points out. Among the most well known of these are the Booth-Kelly sawmill, Mountain States Power company plant, Springfield Mill and Grain company mill, Springfield Lumber company mill in transit plant, Anderson Manufacturing company, Springfield Wood Preserving company plant.

Plants that would have unusual good opportunities for success here are stated by the circular as all mills or factories using wood or wood products, a fruit cannery, a cheese factory, a meat packing establishment and ice plants. When the Nation cut-off is completed, it is pointed out, Springfield will be the first western Oregon city on the line and will handle much of the raw material received from east of the mountains.

DAILY MARKET REPORT

(Oregon Journal Market Review)
PORTLAND, Jan. 8.—Daily product prices showed a general reduction on the exchange for the last session. Continued decline in eggs noted not only on the exchange but on the open market. Not only is there extreme depression in the general trade but receipts continue to pile up.

There is today a greater supply of fresh eggs being received here and elsewhere in the Pacific Northwest than during any previous season for a like period. The increase is most startling at this time. Almost an entire supply of eggs is coming forth at this time as during the flush production period of the spring months. Just what will happen when the real flush season opens is today very hard to tell.

In the meantime holders of storage eggs are receiving the whipping of their lives. Manipulative influence at the start of the season are generally given as the cause of the present depression in eggs, not only here but in the country generally.

Butter Trade Again Easier
Trading in the butter market again indicates an easier feeling. Cubes are lower on both the exchange and on the open market. Discouraged by the price are now as much as five per cent, thereby indicating a lower price.

Veal Strength Pronounced
Market for country-killed calves is again in a very firm position along the wholesale way. Sales are being made with a range of 16 to 19¢ for the better class stock, but the general market is weak and prices apply only to suitable weight and quality.

Fresh Salmon Price Higher
With the northern season closed and only limited catches in the Columbia river, the market for fresh salmon is still very common. First heads are now quoted up to 25¢ pound.
