

FRESHMAN HOOP PLAYERS TO HAVE EXAMINATION

Coach and Four Men Leave For Portland

SPINAL DISEASE FEARED

One Athlete Taken Ill With Spinal Meningitis While Team Away on Trip

Four University of Oregon freshman basketball players, Scott Milligan, Joe Bally, Gordon Ridings and Ted Pope, and Coach Earl Leslie, left yesterday for Portland where they are to undergo a thorough examination by specialists for spinal meningitis.

This is necessary, according to university health officials, because Donald McCormack, a player on the team, recently took ill with the disease while the squad was in Portland on a trip. He is now confined to a hospital in that city.

When the members of the team returned from this trip Monday, they were dismissed from classes at the university and were examined here to ascertain the possibility of their having the disease. Nothing developed from this nor did any member become especially ill, so the four men and coach were sent to Portland for examination by specialists.

Practice Halted

Practice has been called off for a while and will not get under way until the outcome of the examination of the players, it is stated.

A schedule of games was drawn up by Jack Benefield, graduate manager, for the yearling team, yesterday. The opening date is given as January 30, so will insure ample time for the players to get back into condition providing the game is not abandoned.

There is a possibility that a game with Bend high school and Salem high may be added later, Mr. Benefield stated.

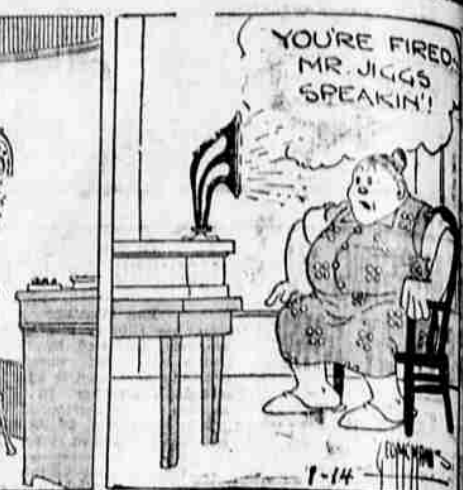

CARPENTIER IN AMERICA

PAOLINO PRAISED BY BOXER FROM FRANCE

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—Georges Carpentier, "orchid man" of France, arrived today on another pugilistic mission to the United States, but this time it is not entirely on his own account.

"Fight?" he repeated. "Most assuredly if the opportunity is good, but you should see this Paolino of Spain if you wish to see a fighter."

Carpentier thus epitomized the main purpose of his visit. Now 32—he celebrated his birthday yesterday—and admittedly past his flistic prime, the "sorgous one" is not particularly anxious for a strenuous program on his own account, though he considers himself in good trim and "would like, Monsieur, a shot at Paul Berlenbach or Young Stribling."

But Paolino! That is another matter, and Georges, with an expressive gesture, mildly asserted the Spaniard is the "greatest heavyweight in the game today," ready now to take on either Gene Tunney or Harry Wills and anxious to prove his right for a match with Jack Dempsey.

Carpentier is here chiefly as advance man for Paolino, who is due in New York in February with his manager, Francis Decamps, and other boxers in the Decamps stable.

SMITH'S WISH GRANTED

COACH'S ASHES TO REST ON MEMORIAL STADIUM

(By The Associated Press) BERKELEY, Cal., Jan. 13.—Andy Smith's last wish is to be fulfilled and as a result his ashes will flutter from the sky to find a permanent resting place in California memorial stadium, scene of his triumphs as football coach for the University of California.

Duan Frank H. Probert, in charge of the public funeral ritual, made this known today upon arrival of the famous coach's body from Philadelphia.

Services will begin at the north gate of the stadium on Friday between the hours of 11 and 12 o'clock. All activities at the university will be silenced for the 60 minutes out of respect for the memory of the late football leader.

At noon, an army airplane, guided by Lieutenant John R. Gluscock, former California football player under Smith, will fly over the stadium and scatter ashes of the late coach over the field.
