MAN DIES OF INJURIES

LUMBER CAMP ACCIDENT IS FATAL TO R. L. SANKEY

Springfield Resident, 20 Years Old, Survived by Wife, Relatives; Funeral to be Monday

(Register Lane County Special) SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Jan. 16.—Robert Lee Sankey, 20, who was injured while at work at a lumber camp near Wendling Friday, died at a local hospital today, and funeral services will be held here, where relatives reside, Monday afternoon. Mr. Sankey was injured when hit in the head by a cable while at work at the camp.

He was married a few months ago to Theda Lyons of Jasper. He is survived by the widow, his father, R. G. Sankey of Springfield, two brothers, Elmer and Horace, four sisters, Mrs. Maude Thienvaalt, Mrs. Laura Duncan and Margaret and Nellie Sankey.

Mr. Sankey was born in Pennsylvania January 30, 1906, and came with his parents to Springfield 13 years ago. He lived here since that time and was well known here.

W. F. Walker is in charge of details of funeral arrangements. Dr. E. V. Stevens will officiate at the services which will be held at the Walker chapel Monday at 2:30 o'clock. Interment will be in Mount Vernon cemetery.

LAND TRACT INSPECTED

EUGENE MAN ACCOMPANIES COMMITTEE MEMBERS

Two Applications for Industrial Sites Already Received by Springfield Officials

(Register Lane County Special) SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Jan. 16.—The industrial and park land site consisting of about 250 acres was inspected today by members of the Springfield park board and industrial committee and representatives of the Eugene and Springfield chambers of commerce in order that they might become acquainted with the tract. H. E. Maxey, chairman of the committee, Herbert J. Cox, president of the Springfield chamber of commerce, Welby Stevens and E. Eugene Chadwick, secretary of the Eugene chamber made the inspection.

The men viewed the entire site and the park site chosen by a sub-committee in the southeast portion of the tract was decided to have possibilities of development. The tract recommended for the park is located on the Booth-Kelly mill race. The land was owned by the men to be very dry during the past week, said Mr. Cox. A tentative scheme of roadways for the district has been worked out by the committee and south roads to give access to the tract and east and west routes to connect with various parts of the land.

Mr. Stevens, who was instrumental in the purchase of the land several years ago for the Southern Pacific company terminals, guided the men about the tract and showed them its boundaries.

"We appreciate the fact that Mr. Chadwick, Eugene chamber secretary, was willing to accompany us on the inspection tour," said Mr. Cox. "We believe the two cities are developing a better spirit of friendliness and cooperation."

Two definite offers from industrial concerns, one a brickyard and the other a tile plant, have been received by the committee. Possibilities of a furniture factory and a flax plant are also evident, it is stated. T. A. Livesley of Salem has written to Mr. Perkins that a flax mill will be established here next year, it was said.

A show will be given each night instead of two Tuesday evenings as formerly planned. A contract will be drawn up by the legion to hold meetings in the Woodmen of the World hall beginning next month.

BILL BOARD AND CHIMNEY FALL AT SPRINGFIELD

(Register Lane County Special) SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Jan. 16.—The heavy wind that struck the upper Willamette valley today caused small damage and much excitement at Springfield when a billboard on Main street between Fourth and Fifth streets and a chimney on a local residence house toppled. The billboard fell about noon and slightly damaged a car belonging to Carl Roserman. Another automobile was struck but not damaged.

The billboard was ten feet high

and 60 feet long. When it fell it completely covered the sidewalk and struck the automobiles parked along the curb.

FINGER CAUGHT IN GEAR OF TRACK SPEEDER

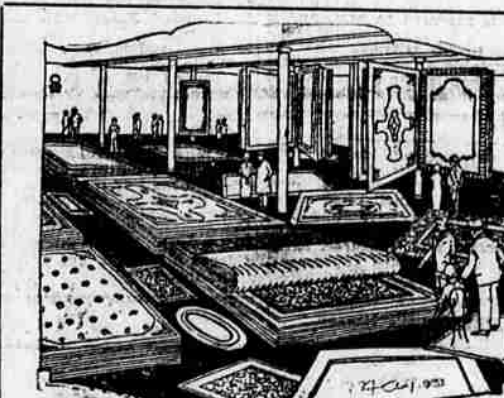

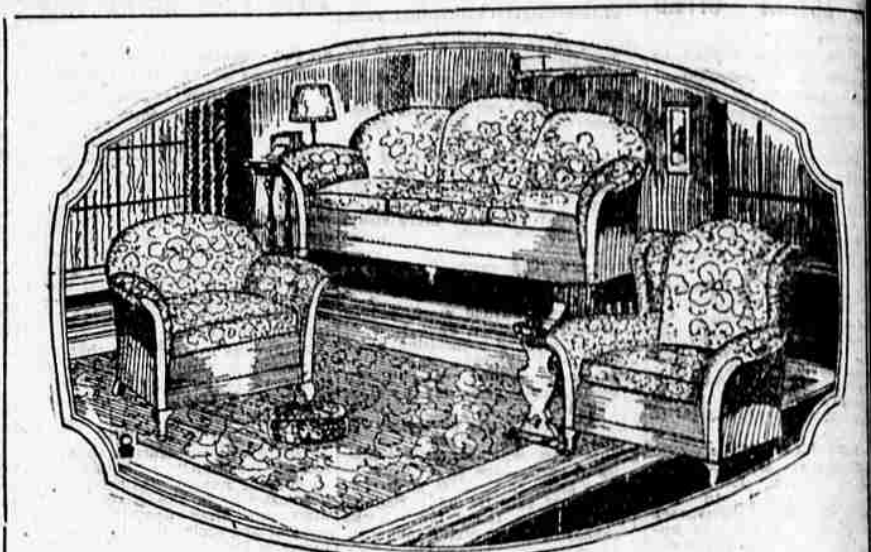
