Forecast Service Has Unusual Applications

where alfalfa is grown as a major industry it is desirable to harvest it at the latest possible time to insure full maturity of the seeds. They must not, however, encounter frost. It is the custom, therefore, in the alfalfa-growing regions of the United States to close down the local weather bureau of the United States department of agriculture when the season nears its end. A special frost-warning service is maintained where conditions warrant it. Growers in these regions are advised to harvest the alfalfa and make haste to harvest the crop at extreme speed between the latest prediction of approaching frost and the actual drop in temperature.

In a similar way in Louisiana,

On the sugar-cane plantations, the weather bureau officials aid planters by furnishing warnings of the approach of frost in time to permit cutting of the cane. The longer the cane can safely stand the higher the sugar content, so it is of considerable economic importance. The weather forecasts should be dependable.

In the Mobile district in Alabama, winter cabbage raising is a large industry. Cabbage fields are usually planted in rows 30 inches or more, the cabbages are planted in loose soil, and while they are not easily injured by frost, a severe freeze would destroy very grain. The growers are advised by warnings in time for them to send men with mules and hand plows into the fields to turn over some of the loose soil so as to cover the plants and protect the growing cabbages. When the freeze is over the soil is raked off and the cabbages grow as usual.

FEDERAL LAWS TO BE DISCUSSED SATURDAY

A Park, state commissioner of horticulture, will be here tomorrow to discuss the new federal horticultural laws as part of the horticultural day and a meeting of the horticultural society will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday according to Howard E. Price, extension engineer of the horticultural society. The place of C. B. Stewart, fruit inspector, whose name appeared on the program for the outline of the three day program follows:

Thursday, January 24
10 a. m.—F. L. Orchard, Pacific horticultural society, 1000 Commercial avenue. Pruning and grafting of trees, pruning of pruned, pruning and sweetening of cherry orchards and sweetening of plum orchards. Use of bladders and sprays on Hungarian plum trees.
11 a. m.—Cover crop.
12 p. m.—F. C. Williams, extension engineer, 1000 Commercial ave. 3, about one-half hour.
1 p. m.—F. L. Orchard, extension engineer, 1000 Commercial ave. Pruning necessary to increase production.
2 p. m.—Howard E. Price, extension engineer, approximately 15 minutes.
3 p. m.—Will not be bearing south of Pruning, pruning and management will be continued.

Friday, January 25
9 a. m.—F. R. Harlow orchard, extension engineer. Study of the new federal laws of handling old walnut orchards and cherry orchards. How these trees have a spread to 40 feet and present a problem. Also study of young plum trees, cherries, young plum trees, etc.

Saturday, January 26
9 a. m.—George Porris place, extension engineer.

MRS. KATE RUSSELL CAME HERE IN 1852

Family Settles Near LORANE in Early Day, Coming Across Plains by Ox Team

Mrs. Kate Cartwright Russell died at the home of her daughter Mrs. Robert Green, in Los Angeles, January 17, according to word received here yesterday. She was aged 80 years.

Mrs. Russell formerly made her home in Eugene with her daughter Mrs. Emma Ward, until five years ago, when she went to California. Besides Mrs. Green and Mrs. Ward, she is survived by a son, Charles E. Russell of Eugene, a daughter, Mrs. Mary Cartwright of Salem, and a son, I. H. Russell of Modesto, Cal.

Mrs. Russell was an early pioneer, having crossed the plains in 1852 in an ox cart, at the age of 16 years. Her father James Cartwright was the pioneer who was killed by the Rogue river Indians in Cove creek canyon by a poisoned arrow in 1852. His father, D. B. Cartwright, founded the Cartwright stage station on the Siuslaw river near LORANE when stages traveled from Portland to Roseburg on the old mountain route.

The funeral service will be held at Medford Thursday morning with interment in the Russell family plot there.
