### RODAKOWSKI ACQUITTED

**RUSSIAN FARMER TRIED ON MOONSHINE MASH CHARGE**  
Claimed He Knew Nothing of Existence of Barrel Beneath His Pig Pen

Peter Rodakowski, the Russian farmer arrested a few days ago by deputy sheriffs when a barrel of moonshine mash was found in a dugout beneath his pigpen, was acquitted by a jury in Justice of the Peace Wells' court yesterday of the charge of unlawful possession of mash.

Rodakowski claimed to know nothing of the existence of the mash, which was 100 yards from the house, and had witnesses to bear him out in his statements. He testified that he suspected a neighbor of placing the mash there, claiming that the neighbor had threatened to make trouble for him.

Rodakowski was defended by Attorney E. O. Jansen and Gordon J. Wells, assistant district attorney prosecuted the case.

The jury consisted of C. W. Mullin, Fred Hydorn, W. E. Powell, Alfred Anderson, Chester Conger and Henry Grant.

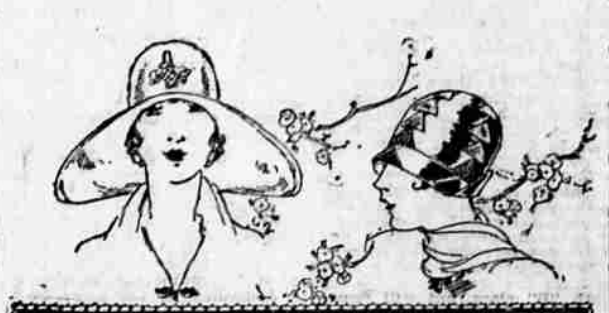
