FRUIT MEETINGS ENDED

LAST SESSIONS HELD AT CHAMBER OF COMMERCE
College Men Discuss Various Problems Pertaining to Horticulture

The final meeting of the three day series held under the auspices of the Lane County Horticultural society were held at the chamber of commerce yesterday, beginning at 10 a. m. and ending late in the afternoon.

The program was carried out as scheduled except that C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector, spoke in place of Charles Parks, state horticultural commissioner, who was billed to discuss horticultural laws. Mr. Stewart stated that the horticultural laws need to be revised as they are out of date. They have been amended from time to time and he declared that they do not fit present day needs.

Clayton L. Long, extension specialist from the state college, discussed general orchard management and the problems affecting the production of apples, pears, prunes and cherries.

Professor H. P. Barge, also of the college, discussed disease control and outlined various methods of spraying orchard crops. He also gave a spray calendar, giving the right time to spray various fruits.

Lee S. Turner, bee specialist of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association, talked on "pollination with bees and the best methods to pursue," while F. E. Price, extension engineer from the college, told of experiments with orchard and vegetable irrigation.

GRAZING CHANGES MADE

NEW LEGISLATIVE PLANS MADE FOR WEST

CHICAGO, Ill., Jan. 23.—Secretary of Agriculture Jardine declared here Friday that a legislative grazing program is being worked out which will combine forestry conservation with extension of legitimate privileges to the stock raisers of the West.

In the same hotel the American society of landscape architects adopted resolutions condemning an alleged legislation campaign by stockmen to seize control of the forests, and "to a permanent hold, negotiable and transferable, upon grazing rights over large areas of individuals and local communities."

UNFAIR METHOD CHARGED

COMMISSION EXAMINER TO HEAR CASE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 23.—The federal trade commission declined today to dismiss a complaint against the American Association of Advertising Agencies, charging unfair methods of competition, and the facts now must be determined by a commission examiner.

The motion for dismissal asserted the commission was without jurisdiction. Commissioner Humphrey dissented from the decision of the majority.

The complaint, issued by the commission more than a year ago, charges a conspiracy between publishers and advertising associations to compel national advertisers to use the associations in placing advertising in newspapers throughout the United States.

MAUD GIVEN RELEASE

VESSEL WILL SAIL NORTH ON TRADING TRIP

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 23.—A ship named Maud was released from libel proceedings in federal court here Friday. The vessel was seized last fall to settle claims when it arrived here from an unsuccessful attempt to drift across the North Pole. The claims were for supplies purchased in Seattle before the vessel left on her three-year journey.

The Maud is to return into the Arctic, but this time as a trading vessel instead of on an exploring and scientific expedition. She has been sold to a British Columbia shipping firm.
