

MANY TRAGEDIES FACED BY THE DOWAGER QUEENS

Marie of Russia Has Another
Great Sorrow in Death

ENDURES MANY SORROWS

Queen of Portugal Suffered Loss of
Husband and Son at Hands
of Bomb-Throwers

(Correspondence of the Associated Press)
COPENHAGEN—Dowager
queens of Europe have suffered
many tragedies in the last half
century.

The Dowager Empress Marie of
Russia, who had another great
sorrow in the loss of her sister,
Queen Alexandra, has probably
been through more horrors than
any royal personage of history.

With the possible exception of
the unfortunate Empress Charlotte
of Mexico, the Dowager Carline
has gone through greater tragedy
than any of her sister queens of
recent times. The strain was too
much for Charlotte's nerves, and
a clouded mind saved her from
full realization of the horrible
slaughter of her husband, Emperor
Maximilian.

Queen Amalie of Portugal, who
now divides her time between Eng-
land and France, suffered the loss
of her husband and older son at
the hands of bomb-throwers, and
saw her younger son dethroned a
year after he had succeeded his
father.

Former Empress Zita of Austro-
Hungary, a refugee in Spain,
where she has her interesting fam-
ily of children about her and is
seeking to advance the claims of
her eldest son, Archduke Otto, to
a throne which no longer exists.
Her fortune is gone. Her empire
in parcelled out among other
powers with republican govern-
ments.

Queen Olga and Queen Sophie of
Greece, respectively, widows of
the Dowager Empress Marie's
brother and nephew, also are
refugees from the country where
they once ruled.

Russia's ex-empress, born of the
Danish royal family, has had a
life as eventful as her sister,
Alexandra's, was peaceful. She
survived her husband, Alexander
III, for thirty years only to see her
plunged into two wars, followed by
a revolution which wiped out all
vestige of kindly power and
butchered her son, Czar Nicholas,
and his entire family.

Another unhappy dowager em-
press was the late Empress Freder-
ick of Germany, mother of the
ex-kaiser. She ruled for only
three months with the dying em-
peror, and as empress dowager of
Germany she was the victim of
personal and political intrigue
which caused her to be hated by
the German people and regarded
as "that evil woman." Even her
son is charged with having
neglected her after he ascended
the throne, and she died twelve
years later.
