ISAAC BLANTON IS DEAD

PIONEER OF OREGON CAME HERE IN 1847

Golden Wedding Anniversary Celebrated Last November 8; Funeral is Thursday

Isaac Blanton, 83, resident of Lane county for more than 25 years, died yesterday at his home six miles west of Eugene.

One of the pioneer boys of the early 40's, Mr. Blanton crossed the plains behind an ox team when he was five years old. With his parents he settled in Marion county in 1847. He was born September 24, 1842.

Mr. Blanton was a life-long member of the Christian church. He is survived by his widow, Rebecca Ellen Blanton, five daughters, five sons, 22 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

The daughters are Mrs. G. W. Duggs, Miss Norma Blanton, Mrs. Harry Taylor, all of Eugene; Mrs. H. W. Huff and Mrs. Floyd Griffin of Portland. The sons are E. F. J. W. and M. A. Blanton of Eugene, J. N. of Oakridge, and G. H. of Portland.

Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Blanton and family celebrated their golden wedding anniversary November 8, 1925. Funeral services will be held at the Veatch funeral home at two o'clock Thursday afternoon with the Pastor of the Christian church in charge of the rites. Interment will take place in the Mulkey cemetery.

Chocolate Meringue Pie

Another Delightful Recipe by a Popular Cooking Expert

Cover an inverted pie plate with pastry; turn back the edges to make it firm. Prick well with a fork to prevent bubbles. Bake in a hot oven, 450 degrees F., about fifteen minutes. Then fill with Chocolate Cream made as follows:

2 squares from 1/2-lb. cake of chocolate
1/2 cup corn starch
2 cups milk

Melt chocolate in double boiler. Blend sugar, salt and corn starch. Add milk. Cook until thick, stirring constantly. Add beaten egg yolks, melted chocolate and Crisco. Continue cooking a minute or two. Pour into the baked shell, cover with meringue made by beating the 3 egg whites until stiff and dry, and add 6 tablespoons granulated sugar. Return to slow oven, 300 degrees F., for fifteen minutes or until brown. Serve when thoroughly cold. Makes one medium sized pie.
