MILL WORK IS STARTED

J. H. CHAMBERS TO BUILD LARGE LUMBER PLANT

New Structure to Be Located at Terminus of New Highway Instead of in Woods

(Register Lane County Special) COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., Jan. 26.—The construction of a new sawmill, 40x700 feet and a remanufacturing plant 4x157 feet, has been started at the terminus of the J. H. Chambers railway just south of Cottage Grove. The construction of the railway has been under way for several months. It was at first thought that the mill would be constructed in the timber in the Eugene valley near the site of the logging operations, but it was later decided to build in near the city.

While Mr. Chambers will make no pretensions as to when the mill will be in operation, work is going on at a good rate. The work on the mill will depend somewhat on construction work on the railway and this is not expected to be completed before the middle of next summer.

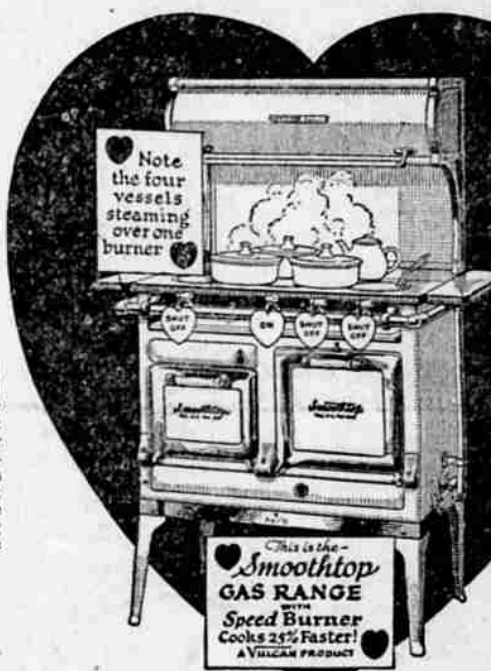
