F. G. red pepper; F. G. paprika. Beat egg until light, then add small amount of oil, beating vigorously between each addition until emulsion is formed. Oil may then be added 1/4 cup at a time; add seasonings and lemon juice. The more oil that is added the thicker the dressing will be.

French dressing: Two-thirds cup oil; 1-3 cup lemon juice or vinegar; 1 teaspoon salt; 1 teaspoon sugar; 1/4 teaspoon pepper; 1 teaspoon paprika.

Mix dry ingredients with lemon juice or vinegar. Slowly add oil, beating continuously. Onion juice may be added if desired.

Normandy salad dressing: One cream cheese; 1 tablespoon lemon juice; 2 tablespoons currant jelly. Mix thoroughly. Add 3-4 cup whipped cream and mix. Put on ice and chill for half hour. Serve on a salad made of grapefruit, green grapes, pineapple or pear.

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Normandy salad dressing: One cream cheese; 1 tablespoon lemon juice; 2 tablespoons currant jelly. Mix thoroughly. Add 3-4 cup whipped cream and mix. Put on ice and chill for half hour. Serve on a salad made of grapefruit, green grapes, pineapple or pear.

Butters: 2 ch biscuits; 2 cups flour; 1 teaspoon salt; 2-3 cup

milk; 4 teaspoons baking powder; 4 tablespoons shortening.

Method: Sift dry ingredients, cut in shortening; add the milk gradually to form soft dough. Roll thin, spread with 1-3 cup butter, creamed and mixed with 3-4 cup brown sugar. Roll up like a jelly roll, cut off pieces one inch thick, put in greased muffin pans cut side up, and bake 15 minutes at 350 degrees F., or moderately hot oven.

Devil's food: Half cup shortening; 1 1/2 cups sugar; 2 eggs; 1 1/2 cups flour; 2 squares melted chocolate (each square 1 ounce); 1 teaspoon salt; 1 teaspoon vanilla; 1 level teaspoon soda; 1 cup sweet milk.

Method: Cream sugar and shortening together, add the well-beaten eggs. Sift flour, salt and soda together. Add to the mixture alternately with the milk. Add the melted chocolate. Lastly add vanilla, mix well and pour into well-greased oblong pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 40 minutes.

Gold cake: Half cup shortening; 1 cup sugar; yolk of 10 eggs; 1/4 cup milk; 1 1/2 cups flour; 3 teaspoons baking powder; two teaspoons flavoring extract.

Method: Cream butter, add sugar gradually and the yolks of the eggs beaten until thick and lemon colored. Add extract. Mix and sift flour and baking powder, add alternately with the milk. Bake 45 minutes in moderate oven (350 degrees F.).

Angel food: One and one-quarter cups egg whites; 1 cup of flour; 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar; 1 teaspoon cream of tartar; 1 teaspoon salt; 1 teaspoon almond flavoring.

Method: Beat egg whites with flat egg whip until stiff enough to hold their own weight. Add cream of tartar when whites are frothy. Fold in gradually the sugar which has been sifted. Fold in flour which has been sifted with the salt four or five times. Pour into dry pan and bake one hour in slow oven (275-350 degrees F.) gradually increasing heat after first 15 minutes.

Chocolate angel food: One and one-quarter cups egg whites; 1 1/2 cups sugar; 2-3 cup flour; 1-3 cup cocoa; 1 teaspoon vanilla; 1

teaspoon cream of tartar; 1/4 teaspoon salt.

Method: Sift the cocoa with the flour five times. Sift the sugar twice. Whip egg whites until foamy. Add the cream of tartar and salt and whip until stiff, not dry. Sift in the sugar gradually, whipping all the time. Add the vanilla. Fold in the flour and cocoa mixture with a spatula. Put in a cool oven and bake at 250 degrees F. for the first 15 minutes, 275 degrees F. for the next 15 minutes, 300 degrees F. for the third 15 minutes and finish baking at 350 degrees F. Bake for one hour.

Seven minute icing with brown sugar: One egg white (unbeaten). Three tablespoons cold water; 1 cup brown sugar. Method, same as above.
