PROGRAM FOR FARMERS' INSTITUTES PREPARED

Three One-Day Meetings Announced By Fletcher

FIRST AT WILLAKENZIE

South Lane Farmers' Union and McKenzie River Farmers' Union Sponsoring Others

Arrangements have been completed for the series of three one-day farmers' institutes which will be held in Lane county next week, according to O. S. Fletcher, county agent, who is in charge for the meetings in co-operation with farm organizations.

The first institute will be held in the Willakenzie Grange hall next Wednesday, February 3, under the auspices of Willakenzie Grange. The second meeting will be held in the Odd Fellows' hall in Cottage Grove on Thursday, February 4, under the auspices of the south Lane district Farmers' Union. Program Announced The program for the meeting to be held at Willakenzie Grange hall February 3 is as follows: 10:30—"Boys' and Girls' Club Work," Arnold D. Collier, county club agent.

11:20—"Poultry Production Problems," H. E. Cosby, extension poultry specialist, O. A. C. 12:00—Basket dinner.

1:30—"Feeding Dairy Cattle," N. C. Jamison, extension dairy specialist, O. A. C. 2:30—"Home Conveniences," Miss Emma Weld, home management specialist, O. A. C.

The Cottage Grove institute will start at 10 o'clock with a talk on "Agricultural Extension Work," by County Agent Fletcher. The remainder of the program will be the same as that at Willakenzie, with two exceptions, as follows: Miss Lucy Case, extension nutrition specialist of the Oregon Agricultural college, will take the place of Miss Weld and will give an address on "Foods" and Professor S. T. White, teacher of agriculture in the Cottage Grove high school, will speak on "Co-operation" at 2:15.

The program for the W. O. W. Hall meeting, which will start promptly at 10:30, is the same as that for the Willakenzie institute with the exception that Miss Case will again take the place of Miss Weld.

While the institutes are held under the auspices of the various farm organizations, they are open to the general public and all interested parties in the districts where meetings are to be held are invited and urged to attend regardless of whether or not they belong to the organization sponsoring the institute, according to Mr. Fletcher.

SEAS SWEEP BY STORMS HEAVY GALES EXPERIENCED ON NORTHWEST COAST Rainfall General in California; Snow Reported in Many Parts of Western States (By The Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 28.—Heavy gales are sweeping the North Pacific ocean tonight and storm warnings have been posted from Reyes to Puget Sound. The storm area is widespread and vessels in the northern and middle portions of the coast are fighting tremendous seas and terrific winds. Smaller shipping is

harbor bound by the disturbance. The United States weather bureau here tonight issued a forecast that the storm would continue for the next 24 or 48 hours and would sweep south of the Tehachan mountains. The rainfall has been general throughout northern and central California while rains and snows have fallen in Washington and Oregon. Rain swept over the Sacramento and lower San Joaquin valleys and is bearing to the north. Heavy snowfall occurred in the Sierritas and Sierra Nevada mountains.
