AMERICA HAS CAVEMEN

**SPIRITS OF PEOPLE IN CAVES,
SAYS DR. BOWMAN**

Presbyterian Pastor from Port-
land Decries Lack of Light
in Assembly Address

That the nation is full of cave-
men, narrow-minded individuals
who live in deep pits where no
light can enter, where truth is but
a shadow and facts are scorned, was
the contention of Dr. Harold
Bowman, pastor of the First Pres-
byterian church of Portland, who
spoke before the assembly at the
University of Oregon Thursday
morning on "Troglydites of To-
day."

"To be sure, we don't live in
caves, but there are still cave
dwellers in spite of their living in
magnificent, well-lighted houses.
The spirits of the people are in
the caves, fearing to turn and face
the bright light of reality and
truth," explained the speaker,
continuing, "if you and I are to be
open-minded people we cannot be
religious cave dwellers or scientific
troglydites, for we may see only
the shadows of life."

America and her people live in
a semi-darkness, contends Dr.
Bowman, knowing only of their
selves and not attempting to look
into the realities of true life, not
attempting to see the other side of
the question even when in doubt.
This he branded as one of Ameri-
ca's most vital shortcomings to-
day. "We need, within American
citizenship, the point of view of
other nations in order to see the
true light," he said.

"In religion the situation is the
same; it is misunderstood because
people are afraid to investigate
with the bright light of truth. Re-
ligion should not live in a cave,
the light should be upon it, and
universities should be temples con-
secrated to eternal truth."

Dr. Bowman was received by the
student body as one of the best
speakers of the year and his tall
figure commanded the audience's
attention easily. Dr. Bowman was
introduced by Dean Henry D. Shel-
don. The girls' glee club gave
several selections and invocation
was delivered by Rev. Bruce J.
Giffen.

MISSIONARY IS ACTIVE

**SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK IS

southwest of Eugene. The first

work, and a service at 7:30
o'clock with a service each
evening of next week at that hour.

These services will be evangeli-

of giving to those that attend a
working knowledge of the Bible.
Kenneth A. Tobias, Sunday school
missionary, says that splendid re-
sults have been noted. At the
Comstock Sunday school a mid-
week prayer meeting was orga-
nized, and in the Gilham, where

reorganized with eight conversions
resulting from the services. These

The Lane county court will sell
road bonds totaling \$43,500 Tues-
day, February 23, according to an
order just signed by the court. The
bids will be advertised at once and
will be opened at 2 p. m. on the
date mentioned, according to the
order.

The money will be expended on
the Roosevelt highway north of
Florence, where the county, state
and bureau of public roads are co-
operating in constructing six miles.
Aside from \$256,000 bonds al-
located to the upper Willamette
highway, this issue is the last of
the \$2,000,000 voted by the people
of Lane county in 1920.
