MAPLE KNOTS SHIPPED

WOOD TO BE USED IN MAKING FANCY FURNITURE

Springfield Man Sends Logs to Eastern Manufacturer's Carload to Be Loaded Soon

(Register Lane County Special)
SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Jan. 30.—One of the most unusual shipments to be handled at the local office of the Southern Pacific company is that of M. O. Walker now at the freight yards, according to Springfield officials of the company. The shipment consists of a number of maple logs made up almost entirely of knots.

The timber is billed for Indianapolis, Ind., where it will be sawed into boards. The lumber thus produced will be used in the manufacture of fancy furniture in which the artistic effect of knotted wood is desired, it was stated.

The logs were in the freight yards today ready for loading and shipment to the eastern city. The shipment here will make up about a carload. The knotted maple wood is highly valued by furniture manufacturers.

LIBRARY REPORT READY

RECORD TO BE PRESENTED AT BOARD MEETING

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Jan. 30.—An average daily circulation of 1246 books for the year 1925 is the record of the Springfield library, according to a report compiled by the library staff. The board will also consider the proposal to purchase the old First National bank building for use as the city hall and the moving of the library to the present quarters of the city officials will be discussed at the meeting.

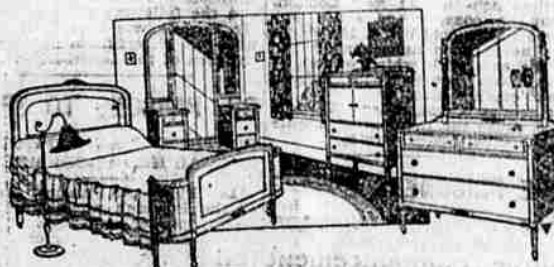

PORTLAND OFFICIALS GIVE EXPERT VIEWPOINTS

Seventy Lane County Farmers Attend Session in S. O. S. Implement Store Here

Seventy Lane county farmers yesterday attended the tractor school and demonstration conducted at the S. O. S. Implement and Hardware company store on Ninth avenue west between Willamette and Olive streets.

Lunch was served at noon, following a morning of practical demonstrations by representatives of the International Harvester company who tore down and re-assembled a tractor. In the afternoon, motion pictures were accompanied

by lectures. The school was voted a success and the farmers expressed the hope that it would become an annual event.

MORE MEN THAN WOMEN

MALE STUDENTS-OUTNUMBER GIRLS AT UNIVERSITY

There are 18 per cent more men than women students attending the University of Oregon this year, according to figures compiled from the annual report of the university registrar.

The report indicates that the women students have not been increasing in number from year to year as rapidly as the men during a period of several years. Three years ago the men were already predominating by 10 per cent. Last year they raised their lead to 16 per cent, and this year to 18 per cent.

The men exceed in number in all classes, and the only group in which the women number more than the men is the arts specialists.
