## WATER COVERS STREETS

SPRINGFIELD MILL CLOSED  
BECAUSE OF RAINS

Street Commissioner Answers Many  
Calls in North Part of Town  
Where Water Collects

(Register Lane County Special)  
SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Feb. 6.—Heavy rains during the night and today caused streets to be flooded in the northern part of Springfield and George Vallier, street commissioner, was kept busy today answering calls from persons complaining that their streets, sidewalks and basements were being flooded. Nothing could be done about the matter, said city officials, as the water flows naturally to the north and relief for that part of the city will come only with a cessation of the storm.

Only a small portion of the city was affected by water yesterday but the continual rains caused ponds to collect on the streets and in low places. The area near the Southern Pacific station was flooded and the water flowed over the walks, forcing pedestrians to use the road. Parts of D and Front streets were flooded this evening. Water reached the running boards of automobiles on north Fifth street from the Coburg road. Between Springfield and Eugene the water inundated the Pacific highway just east of Jenkins point.

After starting again this morning with the power lines, after a breakdown since Tuesday, the Booth-Kelly mill here was forced to close shortly before noon. The high water made operation of the mill almost impossible. Wood refuse could not be removed from the plant because of the water entering the conveyor, said Harry Stewart, proprietor of the fuel company at the mill.
