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## PLANS ALL ARRANGED FOR DEDICATION OF TEMPLE

Bible Standard People Look For Big Meeting

DR. PRICE IS COMING

Evangelistic Campaign to Be Carried on After Lighthouse Temple Is Opened

A big evangelistic campaign is to be conducted by the Lighthouse temple folk beginning February 14 when their new church home is to be dedicated to Dr. Charles H. Price and is to continue about a month under his direction. It is reported that there is to be no material cessation in the holding of evangelistic campaigns throughout the year.

From Dr. Price, who has just closed a revival campaign at Klamath Falls, comes word that he is in correspondence with several evangelistic churches in the full gospel field who are desirous of attending the dedicatory services on the opening day and there is considerable belief that they will be able to do so. Who these evangelists are, and from whence they will come, is not as yet given out, but it may be stated that they are expected from as far distant as Chicago and Canadian points. Already word has been received

from Rev. Harry M. Neel of Lodi, Calif., Dr. William Towner of San Jose, California; Dr. H. C. Miller of Ashland who recently had some trouble in his church at Ashland as to which faction should be entitled to the church building and who graciously abandoned his efforts to hold possession of it; Rev. Mr. Lewis of Klamath Falls; Rev. Mr. Taylor of Vancouver, B. C., who is at the head of a Full Gospel congregation at that place and conducting a temple along the same lines as the local Lighthouse temple; Rev. C. Orville Benham, now in California, who conducted a lively campaign here at Astoria and Willamette streets and derisive, also letters have been received by several from other places that they are very much interested in seeing the building and attending the dedication.

Perhaps there is no minister in the city who has a broader smile than the pastor of the Bible Standard congregation, Rev. F. L. Hornsby, who has been an individual benefactor for the building, appreciating the need of a more commodious place of worship, and furthermore because of his strong evangelistic leanings toward that method of gospel work as being the best for reaching the masses. There have been a great many visitors dropping in from day to day to see the building take on its finishing touches and there have been many compliments heard regarding the scheme of decoration, the homelike surroundings with which one immediately feels comfortable as he looks around.

Architect Prosser, who designed the building, W. W. Johnson, who took charge of the erection of the building, and the Bailey Electric company, who were given carte blanche hand in the

lighting system, are to be commended.

No little credit also, it is stated, should be given to the Eugene carpenters' union, which sent men there day after day working and donating a portion of their wages and some even refusing to accept any compensation for their work.

The membership of the congregation has since its start and sacrificed hobby in the giving of funds toward the construction, and from reports picked up here and there, there has been born into their hearts, a spirit of co-operation hard to define and also hard to duplicate. Men have been known to borrow money at eight per cent to assist in this work. It would be interesting to see this building on its opening day from the facts just mentioned, but there is another factor that may be mentioned that may possibly interest those who feel a certain civic pride in the city and its growth and its possibilities of religious and moral influences and because of its certainty of being a credit to any city.

### Will Seat 3000

The main auditorium and balcony is estimated to seat about 3000 persons besides the choir loft for 60 and its orchestra circle for upwards of 40. There is already a good start made on a permanent orchestra of that many musicians under the direction of Professor Landis.

The basement is being arranged to house the Bible Standard training school under Dean J. E. Conley, and when the school has been transferred from First street under crowded conditions, to the new location, it is expected that it will enjoy a remarkable growth.

It is learned that there is quite a coincidence in Dr. Price's coming to Eugene at this time to dedicate this building from the fact that he has the credit for firing the first gun for the Full Gospel doctrine in a large way, and it may be stated that he has even reason to be proud of his part along this line when he sees the results of it and the part he helped to play in it.

Rev. F. L. Hornsby, the pastor, takes this meeting as extending a cordial invitation to the citizens of Eugene to attend the dedication of the building on Sunday next at 2:30 p. m.

## CONDON MEMORIALIZED BY DEDICATION OF HALL

Building of University Named For Scientist

DR. COPELAND SPEAKS

Rich Legacy of Intellectual Honesty Left by Great Teacher, Says Dr. Warren D. Smith

"This is not merely the dedication of another building on the University of Oregon campus," said Dr. Warren D. Smith, head of the geology department of the University of Oregon, at the formal dedication of Condon hall held last evening. "We are here tonight to memorialize a great life."

Speaking of the fact that Condon chapel, a Congregational church, and Condon hall, a science building on the university campus, should both be dedicated to Dr. Thomas Condon, Dr. Smith said:

"It is a situation unusual in America. On this street, within a few blocks of each other, we have in his name a temple dedicated to the glory of God and a building dedicated to the search of scientific truth. His life was a rebuke to narrow mindedness, bigotry and ignorance, to those who would shut out the study of nature in the name of religion."

### Dr. Condon Religious

"Dr. Condon left a rich legacy of intellectual honesty," Dr. Smith continued, "which is one of the rarest things of life. He was a scientist, one so religious that he would not accept one quarter or one half of the truth, for that would be an insult to his faith."

Dr. Earl L. Packard, head of paleontology or the study of prehistoric life, spoke on the work of Dr. Condon. He characterized the achievement of that scientist as a spreading of the gospel of truth.

"Dr. Condon came from the East around Cape Horn and adopted Oregon as his own state. In addition to his work in establishing a department of geology at the University of Oregon, through his research work and discovery of the bones of prehistoric vertebrates he focused the attention of the scientific world on Oregon," said Dr. Packard. "In his study of vertebrate paleontology, Dr. Condon brought to notice the John Day region, the alkaline lakes of eastern Oregon and some beds at Newport containing remarkable marine mammals. As Dr. Condon gave his time, specimens, theories so freely, it is difficult to estimate from what remains in his own name how great his contribution to science was," said Dr. Packard. "He is known as a great inspiration to scientific research and a preacher of the gospel of truth."

### Dr. Copeland Talks

Dr. Edwin L. Copeland, formerly dean of the college of agriculture, University of the Philippines, gave the principal address of the evening, entitled, "Science and Every Day Life." Edges as a contribution of science to the actual relations of living was discussed.

Two factors determine action, Dr. Copeland stated, these two being custom and ethical ideas. "Ideals are what we think our customs ought to be," he said, "and ideals must change or be given up if the conditions differ essentially. No custom can prevail or endure unless it be good for those who do it."

"The business of a scientist," the speaker concluded, "is to save the tried and proved virtues, as well as to try to rid society of the things proved ineffectual or harmful. No man can long keep a place as an instructor in science at a university, for instance," Dr. Copeland said, "unless he can contribute something to the life of the people outside of his own specialty."

Dr. Edmund S. Conklin, head of the psychology department, spoke on the influence of other lives on the vision embodied in the science building.

Rev. Fred J. Clark gave the invocation.

After a tour of the science building, under the direction of instructors and advanced students, those present returned to the geology department, where refreshments were served.

SESSION TO BE HELD AT WILSON SCHOOL HERE

The next meeting of the Lane county division of the Oregon State Teachers' association will be held at 10:30 in the Woodrow Wilson junior high school of Eugene on Saturday, February 13.

The principal speaker will be Professor Homer Rainey of the university. His subject will be school finance and taxation in its bearings on the schools. Professor Rainey has studied financing for a number of years and is recognized as a competent authority.

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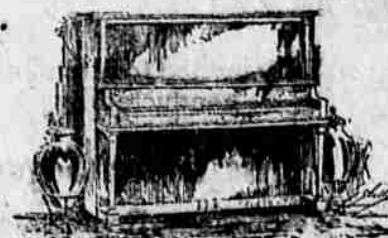
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
