

AMUNDSEN TO LECTURE AS ORIGINALLY PLANNED

Noted Explorer Recovers
From Illness

VISIT HERE FEBRUARY 17

Complete Description of North
Pole Dash to Be Given at Arm-
ory; Hellig in Charge

Captain Roald Amundsen, famous Arctic and Antarctic explorer, will be in Eugene February 17 as originally planned, according to a telegram received by W. B. McDonald, manager of the Hellig theatre, last night from Los Angeles, where Amundsen has been confined for several days because of a severe cold. The Hellig theatre will handle all details of the lecture for the associated students of the University of Oregon, who were instrumental in bringing him here.

As more than 4000 are expected to hear the famous explorer lecture, the armory has been obtained for that night. Motion pictures taken by Amundsen himself will be shown in conjunction with the lecture. They give a complete portrayal of the trip, according to advices received here.

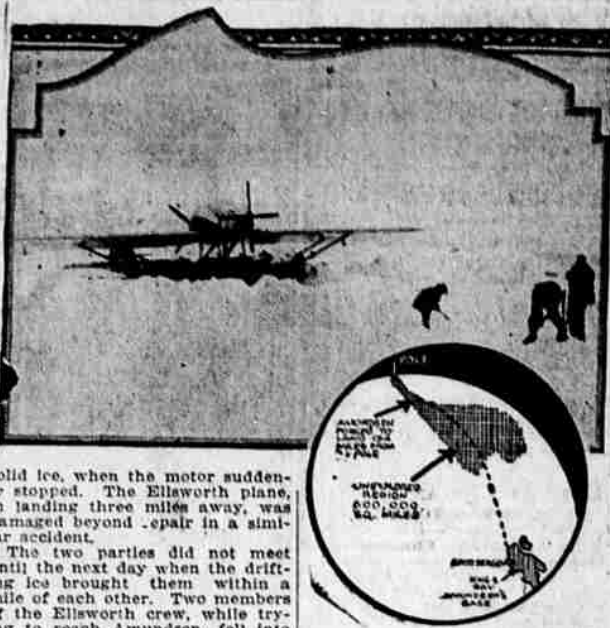
Amundsen will relate the story of his thrilling expedition with his airplane which came only 130 miles short of reaching the North Pole. Adventures on the ice-bound Arctic, when the entire expedition was cut off from the world, and for many days was believed lost, will be described in full by the lecture and pictures, Mr. McDonald said.

Amundsen Heads Party
Last May two airplanes each carrying three men, headed by Captain Amundsen, with whom Lincoln Ellsworth was associated, left Spitzbergen bound for the North Pole. Amundsen and Ellsworth each commanded one plane.

After traveling for a distance of 600 miles over open ice and snow they descended in an open stretch of water to make observations and take pictures, which, incidentally, will be shown on the screen.

In making the descent, however, Amundsen's plane crashed the

solid ice, when the motor suddenly stopped. The Ellsworth plane, in landing three miles away, was damaged beyond repair in a similar accident.

The two parties did not meet until the next day when the drifting ice brought them within a mile of each other. Two members of the Ellsworth crew, while trying to reach Amundsen, fell into the icy sea and almost lost their lives. The temperature then was 12 degrees below zero.

For nearly a month the members of the two crews made their quarters in the Amundsen plane. With sheath knives, light picks and a small ax, they kept the ice away from the plane and finally freed it.

Food Almost Gone
At least the motor was repaired and a runway built to raise the plane. The food supply was practically exhausted and their only means of escape depended upon successful flight of the plane.

The final dash back to civilization created great interest all over the world, as the men had been given up as lost. The king of Norway received the members of the expedition with regal honors and decorated Amundsen at the royal palace.

For a time it was feared that the world-famed explorer would be unable to make his trip here as first reports from Los Angeles indicated that the explorer was so seriously ill that a cancellation of his remaining lectures on his tour of the coast would be necessary. Amundsen will lecture in Port-

land February 18. He will not, however, show his films there, it has been reported.

Tickets for the lecture at the armory are now available through mail orders, which should be sent to Mr. McDonald at the Hellig.

BRIDGE IS INSPECTED STATE HIGHWAY OFFICERS AT HARRISBURG

HARRISBURG, Ore., Feb. 6.—(Special to the Register)—Members of the state highway department, including Roy Klein, S. Sawyer, W. Townsend, C. B. McCulloch and O. A. Chase were here yesterday to take note of the effect of the first real freshet of the winter on the new highway bridge. The two latter named engineers made a careful inspection of the 2000-foot revetment job which was made necessary because of the unlooker for wash on the west bank during the floods of a year ago.

This river at noon was just breaking over the revetment and at this stage of water was fulfilling every expectation of the Mr. McCulloch who designed the work. It was noticeable that where in former years the overflow through the bottom lands formed veritable millraces the water now flowed gently, giving promise of little damage to the farms and garden tracts.

LIONS' PRESIDENT HERE TO-MORROW NIGHT

Reservations for More Than 200
Made at Eugene Hotel for Visit
of Judge Jones

That the Lions' club banquet in honor of the visit in Eugene of Judge Ben Jones of New York City, international president, had not been postponed, and would be held as scheduled at the Eugene hotel Monday night, was the statement made by club officials last night.

Information given out yesterday afternoon to the contrary was branded as erroneous, said Eric Merrill, one of the officers of the Lions' club.

With Judge Jones will be secretary-general, Melvin Jones of Chicago; Edwin H. Ellis of Greybull, Wyo., chairman of the national board of governors; Dr. M. S. Neilson of Salt Lake, international director; District Governor Jack Riley of San Francisco, whose territory covers California, Nevada and the Hawaiian Islands; and others.

Judge Jones will be the principal speaker of the evening. Mr. Ellis, Jack Riley and Frank E. Neer, the latter district governor of Oregon, will also address the members of the organization.

Clubs in the greeting to Judge Jones include Eugene, Springfield, Cottage Grove, Coquille, Corvallis and Toledo. The president will be met in Medford at noon and escorted to this city. Tuesday will appear at a combined luncheon in Portland.

Mr. Merrill, who is deputy district governor and Dr. P. J. Bartle, president of the local club, last night urged every Lion to attend so that a 100 per cent membership could be registered. The banquet starts at 8 p. m. Following this the dining rooms will be cleared for a dance.

TROOP ADDS FEATURES

PARENTS' NIGHT FOR NO. 6
IS MONDAY

Ingenious Contraptions in Scout-
craft to Be Shown at St.
Mary's Parish House

Final plans for the annual "parents' night" of Troop No. 6, Boy Scouts of America, were made at a troop meeting held in the parish house of St. Mary's Episcopal church last night.

Added features to the exhibits were announced, and include a "fire alarm bed" made by Jerome Scott. The bed is an ingenious affair, erected on the sea-saw principle. A log burns at one end. When it has burned out the bed tips, awakens the sleeper, and the latter replenishes the fire with another log.

Signal towers in miniature for fire lookout stations and various kinds of fires will be demonstrated among the exhibits.

Fall in orders will come promptly at 7 o'clock. For the next half hour the boys will be given personal inspection by Nelson P. Macduff and T. M. Gerow, troop committeemen. Following this there will be a scout law ceremony as an introduction to investiture services for new members. This ceremony it is believed, will be the first of its kind given here. The room will be put in darkness. The first scout will give a law, light a candle, the second another law and light a second candle, and so on until the 12 laws have been established and 12 candles lighted.

Rev. Frederick G. Jennings, troop committeeman, will then read the investiture.

At 8:15 p. m. the boys will recommit themselves to the scout oath in connection with a nationwide ceremony at that hour. Dr. R. T. Burnett, troop committeeman, will have charge of this. Award of points in an honor system will follow.

Knot tying, fire by wood friction, and first aid demonstrations will follow. The pledge to the flag will end the ceremonial. Decoration of the hall was being done yesterday.

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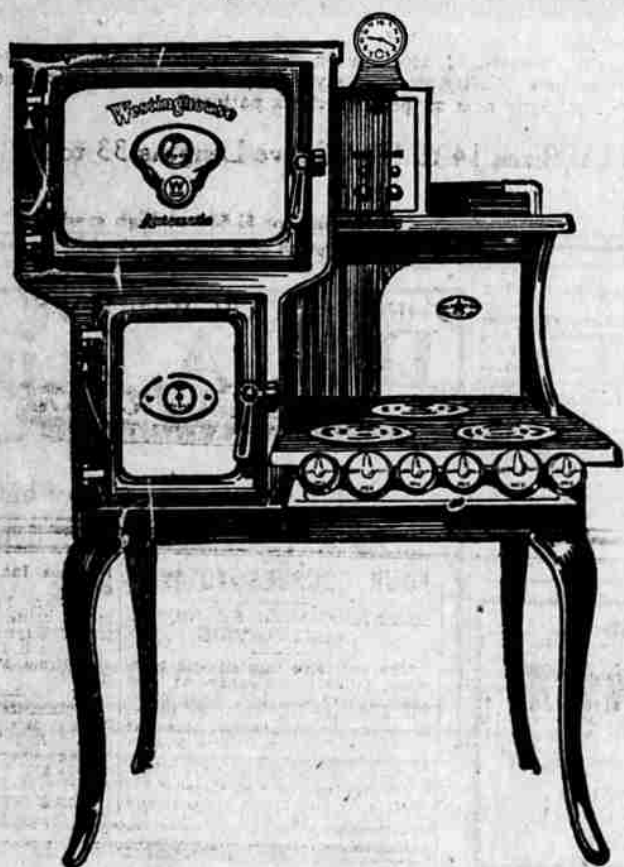
