BASKETBALL PAVILION PLAN GIVEN APPROVAL

Regents Of University Sanction Move

The financing program for the building of a basketball pavilion, which is to cost approximately \$150,000, on the campus of the University of Oregon was approved by the building committee of the board of regents yesterday afternoon, according to Ted Larsen, chairman of the student building committee.

It will be necessary for the board to pass on the findings of the building committee before the program will be effective. The question is to be taken up at the next meeting of the board, which is set for February 25.

The funds for the building of the pavilion are to come from the \$5 per term assessment on each student in the university. The assessment was voted by the student body last year and went into effect last fall.

The pavilion, the plans of which have already been drawn up by Dean E. F. Lawrence of the school of architecture and allied arts, is to seat 5,000 persons and is to be built so that the capacity can be increased to 6,000 by the addition of a balcony. It is to have a spring floor like that of Stanford university. The building is to be of concrete and is to be fitted with more than 12 exits and two main entrances.

It is said that this will be the first building of its kind in the country, and many other colleges are watching the proceedings with interest.

The floor of the pavilion is to measure 104 by 158 feet and will contain two regulation floors for practice. There will be a space of 21 feet on each end for practice at basket shooting.

The site chosen for the building is between Fifteenth and Eighteenth avenues on University street. The committee is ready to let the contracts for the building as soon as the regents pass on the question, if a favorable decision is made. The pavilion will be ready for use by next fall, it is said.

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DUCKS AND GEESE STAY IN NORTH THIS YEAR

Mild Winter Responsible For Scarcity

A notable scarcity of such migratory wild fowl as ducks and geese occurred during the recent fall and winter flight in the Pacific coast states. Sportsmen and others interested in the conservation of our wild life have expressed alarm at this scarcity, fearing that this indicates a permanent decrease in the numbers of these birds.

The biological survey of the United States department of agriculture recently, however, that there was a notably large northward flight of birds in the spring of 1925, and that the situation looks far more serious than it is. The warm winter on the coast of British Columbia and southern Alaska is without parallel. No snow is reported below the 1000-foot level in the very region of southeastern Alaska where a year ago deer were starving owing to the heavy snowfall which buried their food.

Telegraphic reports to the biological survey during the third week of January, 1926, showed an unprecedented number of ducks and geese remaining along the coast of southern Alaska and northern British Columbia. An abundance of ducks and geese has been noted as far north as the flats about the mouths of the Copper and Bering rivers. From Wrangell, Alaska, come reports of many ducks and geese on the flats near there, and the Sitka river flats in northern British Columbia, are reported to be free of snow and ice.

A wireless dated January 22 from the Alaska game commission advised the biological survey that large numbers of mallards and thousands of geese were on the Sitka river flats, a remarkable occurrence for this time of the year.

The scarcity of birds in various parts of the West during the fall and winter of 1925 and 1926 does not necessarily mean a corresponding actual decrease in the total number of the existing wild fowl. Mild fall and winter weather in southern Canada and along the northern border of the United States and the deficient rainfall in the West have caused erratic movements among these birds, many of their usual haunts having been passed over by them in the southward flight.

The fact that millions of birds are reported on some of the large wintering grounds in the southern parts of the country is evidence that vast numbers of them have come down from the North.

HELEN WILLS OBJECTS TO BETTING ON MATCH

Commercialism At Riviera Displeases American

CANNES, France, Feb. 9.—The commercialism which has been entering into Riviera tennis as exemplified by the sale of the exclusive moving picture rights to a private firm and heavy betting on her match with Miss Lenglen, nearly caused Miss Helen Wills, the American champion, to scratch today from the singles play in the Carlton club tournament, and for a hour jeopardized the meeting between the French and American champions.

So disgusted was the California girl with the manner in which the organization has handled the tournament, that according to the belief expressed by her friends, only the thought that her default would be interpreted throughout the world as fear to meet Miss Lenglen in a single combat, prevented her from announcing her retirement.

Torrential rains necessitated postponement of today's event in the tournament and have conspired to delay the Lenglen-Wills match another day, Sunday, February 14, now appears the most probable date for their meeting.

Interest is growing but unfortunately, in the opinion of lovers of amateur tennis, the gambling element has entered the competition and odds are freely offered in the Cannes, Nice and Monte Carlo casinos.
