Just Will Guard Burr In
Oregon-O. A. C. Game

An interesting situation will come up at the University of Oregon basketball game to be played at Corvallis next Saturday night, when two old schoolmates, how on opposing teams, will get together under different circumstances.

Not too many years ago Charles Just stood on the side lines at a basketball game in Roseburg and watched William Burr perform on the smooth floor. Just was tall, awkward-looking, with little knowledge of the game, while the lean Burr weaved in and out among the contestants in the full joy of stardom.

A few days ago this same Just asked Coach Billy Reinhart, of the league-leading Oregon hoopers, for the assignment of guarding "Long Shot" Bill Burr, star hoop ringer of the O. A. C. quintet in next Saturday's game between the rival schools. Reinhart gladly assented, delighted to have disposed of the phantom Burr in a contest.

Just got his start in Oregon "do-nut" basketball, and, under Reinhart's tutelage, has developed by leaps and bounds until he is now recognized as one of the ablest guards ever seen in northwest hoops circles. Burr has continued the even tenor of his way at Corvallis, starring in college ball with the same case that made him outstanding in high school. He is the leading Aggie scorer.

Followers of these two men anticipate a great duel in Corvallis next Saturday when these two old friends face each other in a contest for the conference supremacy. While the Oregon system does not

ordinarily include a man-for-man system, the style is elastic enough to accommodate Just's peculiar request.

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DE MITH AND DAVIS TO BOX TUESDAY NIGHT

Corvallis Man To Be Brought
Here Once More

To support Mack Lillard and Archie Walker on the boxing card at the Winter Carnival gymnasium Tuesday night, Jimmy DeMith of Corvallis and Harold Davis of Eugene have been signed to fight in the ring for six rounds. It was announced last night by M. A. Galloway, promoter.

With the signing of these two fighters for the semi-finals, plans were completed for one of the best cards ever sponsored in Eugene, the official said. DeMith selected the pick of the fighters that have ever entered the local sporting circle, for the bout next week, Cal Herman, veteran referee, said when notified that the two boxers were on the card.

Probably two four-round fights would be arranged for, and besides "we are going to have a red-hot curtain raiser," Mr. Galloway said. In his characteristic style of describing what is coming, "Since I have already gotten four of the best men possible for the fight, I want to get the pick of the preliminary material for the remainder of my card," the promoter continued. "Those two little Murphy brothers please the fans. They may fight again, or I have a new feature I have been figuring that I might use. Anyway, I don't think I will give out anything on the 'curtain-raisers' and surprise the fans."

With this bit of information expressed, Mr. Galloway referred to his signing of DeMith and Davis. "I went to Corvallis yesterday," he said, "and finally got the two boys to agree to fight here Tuesday. DeMith has had 'easy pickings' nearly every time he has fought here. He has got a powerful swing, and also knows how to cover up."

Davis claims Eugene his home, but he has fought in nearly every city in the Northwest. It is reported that his list of victories is longer than any boxer ever recording on a local program in his class, according to Mr. Galloway. Both Davis and the Corvallis man will weigh in at 135 pounds.

It is reported that a seven-piece orchestra will be on deck again to entertain the fans before the card starts.

DIRT FARMER AND HIS PROBLEMS

W. M. Jardine, Secretary of Agriculture, Makes Statement on Subject of Plan to Handle Surplus Farm Products

Now that the plan to aid co-operative organizations has been introduced before Congress I feel that I should make an attempt to explain the plan as it is being considered by the agricultural surplus problem.

During the past several weeks I have been under consideration with co-operative marketing organizations, a plan for aiding and assisting co-operative effort. A bill embodying this plan and carrying out the details of a plan other proposed have been introduced in Congress and others are in the course of preparation.

With the sincere feeling that a further crystallization of thought and development of a common aim can and should be secured on this vital problem I have decided to call to Washington from time to time a number of leaders who can make a contribution looking to the laying down of a sound and effective plan. I have already issued an invitation to the agricultural editors of the country to come to Washington to discuss the surplus problem among other things in order that I might have the value of their knowledge and experience as reflected in different sections. I propose to call other leaders starting immediately.

Little squares of circles of linoleum under your plant jazz will protect the furniture. Dampness rots linoleum and is not to be purchased for this use, but left-over pieces can be utilized while they last. Rubber mats serve this purpose. The small rubber mats used for state steps may be purchased very cheaply and two or three circles may be cut from these to fit your plant base.

To Save Motions
In your large salt shaker mix one part of pepper to ten parts of salt; thus making one shaker serve where two were required before. This also saves reaching separately for both salt and pepper shaker and putting both back and saving two shakers sitting around. Conveniently near one should have a dish of salt for use where that is desired alone.
