This piece was assessed at \$4,000 for 1925, and I figure that the purchaser will pay in taxes the first year (1925) taxes due this spring approximately \$115 on property that he purchases for \$100

Here is a piece of Lane county timber that was assessed at \$4,000, and yet is actually sold—not merely offered for sale—for only \$500.

It seems to be clearly apparent from this instance that there are great inequalities in assessments in Lane county.

Pus Pockets in Body Are Dangerous

Hip-Joint Disease Results from Repeated Infection by Poisonous Germs Which Thrive if Your Vitality Is Low.

Not so long ago a friend of mine asked me to go to the hospital to see her husband who was very ill.

He had symptoms which indicated "sepsis," or "blood-poisoning," as most of us call it.

Whenever there is an accumulation of pus in an enclosed place there is sure to be trouble.

The local symptoms of abscesses, unless they are of the "cold" or inactive type, are practically the same as the symptoms of all inflammations.

It is very necessary to build up the general health. By raising the powers of resistance, it is possible to fight off the tendency to recurrences of the inflammation.

Answers to Health Queries L. A. K. Q.—What causes puffs under the eyes and what causes black specks to appear before the eyes?

M. B. Q.—What causes ringing in the ears? Answer.—Usually nasal catarrh which has extended to the middle ear.

N. M. M. Q.—What do you advise for excessive gas in the stomach and what is the proper kind of food for the condition? Answer.—This condition is probably due to indigestion.

J. F. Q.—How can I get rid of pimples? Answer.—By correcting the diet and cutting down on sugar, starches and coffee.

SAM J. Q.—What causes one to feel heavy, and belch gas for about two hours after eating? Answer.—This condition is probably due to hyperacidity.

L. M. R. Q.—What causes my four-year-old girl to awaken every night and cry and scream? Her

Amount of Grimm Alfalfa Seed Depends on Seed Bed

If Soil Is Moist, Fine and Firm, and Free from Weeds, Less Seed per Acre Will Be Required.

The rate of sowing Grimm alfalfa in Oregon depends in part on the condition of the seed bed.

Good stands of Grimm alfalfa, the best for Oregon has been got by the experiment station with 8 to 20 pounds an acre, depending on conditions.

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partment station results indicate that Grimm is the best variety to sow. It is used quite generally in western Oregon.

State Dairymen Will Meet at Astoria This Week

Both Marketing and Production Problems to Receive Attention at Session that Will Begin on Wednesday.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, CORVALLIS.—Both marketing and production of their product will be stressed at the annual convention of the Oregon State Dairymen's association at Astoria, February 17 and 18.

Oregon growers planning to sow vetch this spring should do so during February, advises the experiment station. It has been found that plantings made after March 1, are of little value.

Marking problems will receive major consideration the first day and dairy production the second.
