

MT. DAVID HILL CLIMB BECOMES ANNUAL EVENT

Motorcycle Test Expected to Draw Many

Several thousand people from different sections of the state are expected to witness the Mt. David hill climb of the Eugene Motorcycle association, near Cottage Grove on Memorial day, officials of the local club say.

The hill climb has come to be regarded as an annual event.

Several other strictly club programs are to be given in the near future also, plans for these being discussed at the annual meeting held Thursday night. Chief among these is a membership campaign and the opening of a motorcycle bureau in the motorcycle agency shops for members.

Organization of a polo team was also taken up. The Eugene association had one of the first polo teams on the Pacific coast. It was said.

Van Kemery, secretary of the club was honored by special mention of his services. Van has been secretary since 1923 and is the oldest officer in the organization.

The Eugene Motorcycle association participated in one endurance run, one hill climb, three joint races, one non-stop run and five race meetings during the last year. Checking for the Portland reliability run was also handled by officials of the local organization when the Rose city riders passed through a few days ago.

Many of the members attended the national gymnasium held at Long Beach, Washington, June 16, 17 and 18, 1931.

Two northwest champion dirt track riders are members of this club. W. R. Davis, local Harley Davidson dealer holding the northwest side-car championship for the half mile, winning this title in 1929.

Yale E. Smith, Indian dealer, holds the northwest dirt track championship for the solo machine which he won in Yakima last September.

The local organization last year promoted more motorcycle activities than any club in the state on the Pacific coast and in consideration of this the American Motorcycle association, headquarters in Chicago, issued the Eugene members sanction No. 1 for the annual New Year's endurance run, the first time it was ever issued to any club except the Crotona Motorcycle club of New York city, which holds a run at the same time.

The Eugene run is known as the longest and hardest endurance run ever held on a New Year's day. It has had all the nationally known riders such as W. E. Scott, north holder of the three-day record; Paul Renaldi, holder of the coast to coast record.
