MANY HAVE INFLUENZA

SPRINGFIELD FREE FROM CONTAGIOUS DISEASES

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Feb. 13.—Many Springfield residents and residents of nearby districts are ill with influenza but no contagious diseases have been reported here for some time, according to Dr. W. H. Pollard, city health officer. Influenza is prevalent in almost all valley communities at present, it was stated.

Though mumps has been reported in Eugene and other communities none have been reported in Springfield, the physician said. A few cases of whooping cough are believed to exist here but none has been reported to the health officer.
