

ONE MAN IS SENTENCED AND OTHERS INDICTED

Carl Sanzo Pays His Fine of \$100 and Is Released

SEVERAL ARE ARRAIGNED

Alfred Dill Pleads Guilty to Forgery Check and Will Be Sentenced Friday at 10 a. m.

Carl Sanzo, who was indicted Tuesday by the grand jury on a charge of larceny, yesterday, after being arraigned in circuit court, waived time for entering his plea and pleaded guilty, and waiving time for giving sentence, was fined \$100. He paid the amount and was released from the county jail, where he had been confined for a number of weeks.

Melvin Coy, charged with forgery, was arraigned and will enter his plea Friday at 10 a. m. Alfred Dill, indicted for uttering a forged check, entered a plea of guilty and will be sentenced Friday at 10 a. m. It was announced.

The grand jury yesterday returned four indictments and asked for a number of other cases, including that of Eleanor Burchell and Laura Pauline Breake, students at the University of Oregon, who are accused of shoplifting. The indictments were returned against Lawrence Tressler, charged with larceny of Robert Biddle's automobile December 12.

E. L. Pierce, accused of adultery, alleged to have been committed February 8. His wife, Marie Pierce, is the complaining witness.

W. W. Wilmet, who swindled the Eugene hotel out of \$156 by a bad check December 27, the charges being obtained money by false pretenses.

William Greer, charged with driving a car while intoxicated, alleged to have been committed January 12.

These men were arraigned afterward. J. L. Ray was appointed to defend Tressler; James Kline was appointed as counsel for Pierce, and C. N. Johnston has been retained as attorney for Wilmet and Greer.

WHISKY STILL IS SEIZED

ELMER JENSEN, ALLEGED OPERATOR, IS HELD

Plant in Operation When County Officers Make Raid on Ranch Northwest of City

Claiming they discovered a complete whisky plant in operation on a ranch four miles out on the Elmina road, Sheriff Frank Taylor and county officers last night arrested Elmer Jensen, 29, farmer of that district.

Jensen is being held on a charge of illegal possession and it is possible he will also be charged with operating a moonshine still.

With Sheriff Taylor were Gordon Wells, deputy district attorney, Melvin Turnbull and John Watson, deputy sheriffs.

The officers allege they found about 75 gallons of mash and a small quantity of liquor that had just been run off of the still.

The raid on the ranch, said to be rented to Jensen, was made at about 7:30 o'clock in the evening, the officers and their prisoner returning to the city at about nine o'clock.

Officers seized the still and liquor and will hold both in evidence against Jensen. The mash, in two barrels, was confiscated.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Feb. 17.—"Wealthy Widows of the Bay Cities," said to contain some 800 names and to sell for \$40, is the latest directory to come to the attention of the state corporation commission.

"All sorts of directories are called to our attention," said J. L. Day, secretary of corporation commission today. "There are directories of farmers and the time of the year they receive returns on their crops; directories of persons who have recently inherited wealth, of the large tax payers and countless others."

FINAL ARGUMENT STARTS

LONG DISCUSSION EXPECTED FROM PROSECUTION

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 17.—In the government's final attack against 29 persons charged with operating a liquor conspiracy, C. T. McKinney, United States district attorney, used the entire day to conduct his closing argument.

McKinney discussed the charges against each individual and disposed of only a third of them when court adjourned for the night. This indicated the case will be given the jury before Friday or Saturday.

I believe that we are suffering under two delusions concerning women today. One class degrades the emancipation of women, and would have us believe that short skirts, sports, and plain speaking, have banished all charms and real womanliness. They cling to the nineteenth century type, and have convinced themselves that real woman can only be synonymous with crinolines, bustles or waists. The other class is just as much in error, for though they revel in modern woman and glory in the equality of the sexes, they lose their sense of perspective when it comes to gifts. They want sporty women, and they hail athleticism as a glorious gift.

Athleticism is not a great gift. I believe any fool, and certainly most nonentities, could easily learn to play tennis, to swim, to dance, or to ape the man in fashion with admirable efficiency. Of course, such talents as those of Mme. Lenglen are glorious gifts, but they are akin to genius.

What, then, is woman's greatest gift?

Beauty is, perhaps, the word that will flash to the mind of every woman. Most wonderful of gifts is beauty, and I wish all those who possessed it realized their glorious heritage. But I will pass it over for charm. Offer me beauty and charm, and I would seize the two with eagerness, but of the two charm would be always my first choice.

A woman must be born with charm. She can make herself charming for specific occasions, but she cannot learn to be charming, for born charm is ever present, and permeates every action and enriches every gift.

Charm, to me, means an elusive grace which animates the plainest woman and can make the greatest beauty seem deadly dull.

After charm, a whole host of qualities crowd themselves before me. Sympathy, friendship, patience, candor, particularly appeal to me, but so do many others. It is not necessary for happiness that a woman should be humorous, but I do not know what life would be like without a sense of humor. But there is one so-called gift that I cannot support. Men say women have a wonderful intuition peculiar to the sex, and so enviable. I know nothing of it, and I cannot attach any importance to it.

It is so hard to choose the really highest gift open to the cultivation of all, but I think that if my choice were limited, it would fall either upon charm or tact—and perhaps each is included in the other. I can think of no better combination, and it is a combination within the scope of all. The one embraces the essence of true womanliness and presents them in a perfect union, and tact knits together all the other attributes and moulds and modifies them so that each is called upon to the best advantage.

CORLEY MAY RECOVER

SEVEN PRISONERS IN BULL PEN AT MALLER

SALISBURY, Ore., Feb. 17.—Albert Corley, negro convict, one of the nine men shot during the penitentiary riot Tuesday has an even chance of recovery, prison physicians declared tonight.

As a result of an investigation into the uprising, seven prisoners, alleged to have been the ringleaders in the affair, are to be confined in the "bull pen" to serve indeterminate sentences. They also will be dressed in the regulation striped suits and be classed as "incurables."

In line with his policy of maintaining strict discipline in the prison, Warden J. W. Little today issued orders that hereafter armed guards will be stationed in the cell cage suspended from the ceiling of the prison dining room during meal hours. This precautionary measure was eliminated 12 years ago and since that time the dining room guards have been unarmed.

Another order that went into effect today prohibits the convicts from having matches in their possession while outside of their cells.

TRAIN WRECK HURTS TWO

SANTA FE COACH GOES INTO DITCH NEAR LEGRANDE
