LIONS HEAR STEINER

POSSIBLE SENATORIAL CANDIDATE IS SPEAKER

Springfield Men Listen to Non-Political Talk; Bridge Committee Reported Chosen

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Feb. 19.—Frederick Steiner of Pendleton, candidate for nomination for United States senator, addressed the Springfield Lions club at the weekly luncheon this noon. Mr. Steiner did not touch on politics and spoke briefly of the character of his district when he was a student at the University of Oregon about 20 years ago.

Mr. Steiner was well acquainted with Eugene and Lane county when he went to college and told of some of his experiences at the university and his contacts with local people when he came to Eugene bank. He also told of his experiences in eastern Oregon where he has practiced law since his graduation.

Two other visitors, Ben F. Dorris and I. N. Peterson of Moro, were guests of the club and spoke briefly.

DAILY MARKET REPORT

(Oregon Journal Market Review)
PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 19.—Prices quoted for eggs on the daily exchange for the latest session were evidently meant as a joke, for the values listed are impossible to enforce in the general trade. For instance, the price of extras was cut in dozen, placing it at the same height as standard firsts. Then mediums or pullets were cut in, placing the price at 25c, the same as for current receipts, the ungraded stock.

Despite this balling of values on the exchange, which prices few are paying any attention to, the trend of the trade is weaker with a generally lower price than likely to be received. In the open trade, values are lower.

Price shading has been noted for the last two days. Increasing supply is noted and as there is practically no outside demand of note, efforts are being made to unload the surplus in the local territory.

Butter Situation Still Quiet

With a slightly easier tone, market for butter showing a very slow movement. Cubes were unchanged except for

standards, which were lower on the exchange. On the open market prints were stationary.

Chickens Show Accumulation

Accumulation of chickens has been started in a small way here, although the surplus as yet has not become burdensome. Prices, while a trifle easier, are as yet unchanged.

Meat Situation About Same

With the bulk of top country-killed calves moving at 15c pound, a fairly steady tone is shown for the day, with receipts rather liberal. Hogs are showing practically no change, bulk of tops moving at 15c pound.

Potato Marketing Stagnant

Practically all potato markets of the west coast are showing a stagnant tone at this time, with speculators rather worried regarding their inability to force a movement. Primary points show little activity.

Broccoli Market Hit a Blow

California's broccoli which sold as low as 75¢ per crate during the last 24 hours, has done considerable injury to the local market for the southern Oregon product. Prices on the latter nominally the same.

Brief Notes of Wholesale Trade

Looks like higher prices for head lettuce next week, with most of the offerings consisting of 14c. Stiffer prices indicated the coming week for oranges.

Onion trading very slow and prices rule weaker.

Rhubarb market steady at unchanged prices.

Artichokes more plentiful and prices lower.

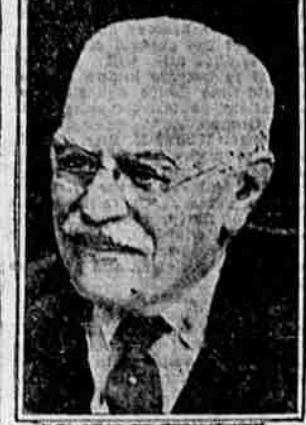
