HEALING SERVICE MONDAY

LAST NIGHT'S PRICE MEETING ONLY PREPARATORY

"Golden Grain," Evangelist's New Magazine, Introduced at Lighthouse Temple

No. 1, Vol. 1 of Golden Grain, a monthly publication of Dr. Charles S. Price, devoted principally to the exposition of full gospel evangelism, which is to have an international circulation with correspondents from all parts of the globe, was introduced to the audience at the Lighthouse temple yesterday and the first subscribers were Rev. F. L. Hornsby, pastor of the temple.

The headquarters for the magazine is to be at Seattle, it was learned, and the home of the editor-in-chief is to be at Napa, Calif.

It is understood that the object of the founder of the publication is to better acquaint people with the real facts concerning the full gospel movement and that he felt the necessities of the times demanded it.

The afternoon services are reported to be very helpful to professing Christians as they are devoted to the teaching of some phases of the operations of the Holy Spirit.

Instead of a divine healing service last evening as had been given out, it was to be a preparatory service and that the healing services would be Monday evening. "Tonight's sermon will be a 'Saturday night' message and on Sunday night, 'The Ark is Coming up the Road.'"

Reading from Luke, the 18th chapter: "Jesus, thou Son of David, have mercy on me," cried blind Bartimeus, as he sat by the Jericho road listening to the multitude as it passed by and upon inquiry ascertained the reason for it, I. e., that Jesus was passing by.

A great concourse of people had assembled to see and hear the Man of Galilee, and it was always so, the speaker stated, "and I don't believe Jesus has ever lost his magnetism to attract people, if Jesus is preached in His entirety and purity," said Dr. Price.

He explained that that was one of the things that the full gospel preachers are contending for, while for the most part he thought that all the people were getting from some pulpits was a history of Jesus and his teachings.

"Of course people were attracted to see and hear Jesus and witness the miracles that he did and it is no less true today, Bartimeus was a man whom only one could help. No wonder he cried: 'Jesus, thou Son of David, have mercy on me'—and Jesus was that one."

"There comes a time," said Dr. Price, "when one may look this way and search that way, but there is only one who can help. It is the man with the seamless robe."

The sweetest words in this chapter, he continued, are, "and Jesus stood," Jesus stood for me, he said, and he will stand for you.

"The greater one's misery, dirt and squalor, the more one may count on Jesus."
