FREE TEXTBOOKS ASKED

C. A. HOWARD SPEAKER AT SPRINGFIELD MEETING

More Economical Method Wanted for Supplying Material to Pupils in Oregon

(Register Lane County Special) SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Feb. 20.—The use of "public" textbooks in the schools of the state is favorable to C. A. Howard, of Marshfield, candidate for the office of state superintendent of public instruction, who addressed the Parent-Teacher association here yesterday. Public textbooks, while they would add slightly to the tax levies throughout the state, would in the long run be much cheaper than textbooks under the present system, in the opinion of Mr. Howard, who also advocated, according to P. T. A. officials, that the state print the books.

Under the plan advanced at the meeting, all textbooks now in use in the public schools of Oregon, would revert to the state. An argument that is constantly brought against the proposition—that public textbooks would be insubstantial, is said by P. T. A. officials to be without grounds. A system of regular fumigation of school rooms would be arranged, whereby the spread of any disease germ would be checked. The use of public textbooks in schools is held to be no more insubstantial than the use of library books under the present system.

PROGRAM TO RAISE FUNDS FOR MILD UNDERWAY

(Register Lane County Special) SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Feb. 20.—The Parent-Teacher association today conducted a cooked-food sale, as part of a program to raise funds to carry on the work of supplying a part of 70 Springfield school children who are undernourished, with special lunches of milk and graham crackers. Mrs. Paul Brattain, president of the association, reported the successful improvement in the health of the children under treatment had resulted. A combined patriotic and health program is being arranged by the association to be given Monday evening. Speakers will be Dr. F. W. Pollard, who will speak on "Health," and R. U. Moore, of Eugene, who will give a patriotic address. One club of the junior and senior high schools will present numbers. The final feature of the program will be a community "sing." The meeting will be at the high school auditorium.
