TALK ACROSS CONTINENT

DR. STIVERS AND WEST VIRGINIA MAN CONVERSE

Minister in East Calls up Local Pastor Over Telephone About Holding Meeting... Dr. E. V. Stivers, pastor of the First Christian church of this city, had an unusual experience last night. Contemplating a trip to the Middle West in a short time, he placed a notice in two of his church papers published in that section of the United States, stating that his services would be available for a short evangelistic meeting. He was surprised about 9 o'clock last night to receive telephone call from Fairmount, West Virginia. When he answered he learned that it was the pastor of the Christian church in that town who wanted him to hold his meeting there. Dr. Stivers said that the voice of the West Virginia minister was heard very distinctly and that the conversation lasted for several minutes. The local pastor was told that the rate for conversations after midnight was low and that all the eastern minister had to pay for that message sent across the continent at that time of night was \$1.50. The time was after 12 in West Virginia while it was but a few minutes after 9 here.

While in Portland, he said he received encouraging reports from men in positions to know the situation there.
