FLOOD INJURES TRESTLE

HARRISBURG TRESTLE IS UNDERMINED BY WATER

HARRISBURG, Ore., Feb. 20 (Special to the Register).—A section of the trestle at the west end of the new Harrisburg bridge is in danger of being seriously damaged should there be another flood.

The revetment for a distance of about 20 feet has been undermined and the piling which formed this section is floating, cable and wire netting holding them from going down stream. A wash, which cut out a channel back of a large portion of the revetment wall, is regarded as a serious menace in the event of another high water.
