

UPHEAVAL IS LOOKED FOR

DR. PRICE SAYS REALIGNMENT IN ORTHODOXY EXPECTED

In Two Years, He Predicts, Things Will Happen That Will Startle Men Out of Complacency

"Within two years there will be a realignment in orthodoxy that will startle men out of their smug complacency," dramatically declared Dr. Price last evening at the "Lighthouse" temple, while speaking of some of the revival campaigns he has been holding in many of the large cities in the United States and also in Canada.

He went on to say that there are people who are hungry for the truth, also people who are willing to point the finger of scorn at those who dare to preach it.

The services began with the singing of "Onward Christian Soldiers, Marching as to War," after the evangelist had told a story of his own untiring in marriage a colored couple. The bride was tall and slim, the groom was short, but brave and the guests called for a wedding march but as no one knew one, someone played this well-known hymn and the delighted couple marched in, keeping time to the music.

Dr. Price, Dr. A. D. Danford of the Methodist church, offered prayer and Miss Carvell sang "The Old Song of Jesus Love."

The sermon subject was taken from Acts 1:8 which gives us the story of the disciples going down to Samaria to preach Jesus.

The speaker stated that Samaria was a hard evangelistic field. The day of Pentecost had come and gone and Peter had been exalted with power.

The evangelist stated that many preachers have had visions of the "fields white to the harvest," but they felt unequal to the task because of their lack of power. He said that power to preach Jesus came from baptism with the Holy Ghost.

He stated that the Holy Ghost does not baptize everyone, that his presence in one's heart is not primarily to fill it with ecstasy, but to endow it with power and inspiration for service.

Dr. Price spoke of the estrangement of many of God's people as being a regrettable thing and that he believed in the solidarity and Christian fellowship of the disciples of the Lord with all his heart.

"Every man who becomes a disciple of the Lord Jesus Christ, through the acceptance of Him as a personal Saviour," he said, "automatically becomes a member of the church of God. He is set aside for that purpose, but it takes the personal baptism of Jesus to make it possible."

Waxing eloquent again he declared that "men have been known to say that there is no heaven and no hell and to deny the virgin birth of Jesus. No mental application can grasp the fact of a 'born again' experience. No wonder, it is a spiritual application. Spiritual things are spiritually discerned."

He closed with the statement that men of today are living over a volcano which is liable to soon burst. No man, he said, is immune to the devil, the works of the Holy Spirit.

GLEE CLUBS ARE GREETED WITH MUCH APPLAUSE

Combined Chorus Work Exceptionally Fine; Singing of Ballad Feature of Event

Each number on the program of the annual home concert of the men's and women's glee clubs of the University of Oregon was received with such a burst of applause that, beyond a doubt, the production should be marked as a distinct success.

This concert, which was held in the women's building last evening, is the second of the combined home concerts given by the glee clubs.

The feature of the concert was the singing of the musical score of Alfred Noyes' poem "The Highwayman" as arranged in ballad form by Mark Andrews. The chorus for this piece was the combined glee clubs, with Leota Biggs and Roy Bryson as soloists.

This was followed by selections by the men's glee club. In "Uncle Remé, by Homer, the deep voices of the men blended appealingly with the simple but melodious theme. In the rendering of "Sweet and Low," by Barnby, an old favorite was given tender and sympathetic treatment.

"Archers' Marching Song," by Smith, offered a stirring contrast; vigorous, full and true ran the notes of the song in praise of the sturdy English yeomen. As a bit of fun, the men's glee club gave an encore, "The Ballad of Mary Ann"—and the trials and troubles of her mistress.

Two of the imaginative compositions of Wars were in the group of songs chosen by the girls' glee club. The first, "Boat Song," the rhythm of melody and words suggest the rocking of a boat, which a child dreams will carry it far away. "Mamma's Song" had tender and whimsical appeal. "The Old Reel" by Reister followed. As an encore to this group, "If My Songs Had Airy Pinions," was given.

Eugene Carr, baritone, showed sympathy, understanding and emotional pulse and power in his solo "Hear Me Ye Winds and Waves," by Handel. As an encore "Danny Boy" was sung as tenderly and truly as that composition always should be sung—and seldom is.

Perfect technique and a tenor voice of rare beauty combined to make the solo of Roy Bryson well received. "Ah Love But a Day," by Beach, was followed by an encore, "A Cottage Small."

In conclusion the quartet and men's glee club sang the Oregon songs, softly, under the leadership of John Stark Evans, who was director of the affair.

WOMAN PLEADS GUILTY

MARIE ROIG TO ACCOMPANY HUSBAND TO PRISON

TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 25.—A few hours after she had learned that her husband had been sentenced to the state penitentiary at Walla Walla, Marie Roig, Tacoma mystery woman, today pleaded guilty to a grand larceny charge and was sentenced from one to three years at the same institution.

Although her constitutional rights were explained to her, Mrs. Roig told the judge that she wanted to plead guilty.

Her husband was sentenced yesterday to 10 years in prison from Olympia under the name of Alfred Simmons Gregg. He was convicted of attempted auto theft.

Mrs. Roig, or Mrs. Gregg was arrested two weeks ago while trying to dispose of 30 pieces of sterling silver. For several days she had refused to tell anything of herself until it was finally established that the silver and even the clothing she wore had been stolen from Portland.

He said he saw a group of boys playing beside East 32nd street and that James Clement ran across the street. Cheney applied the brakes so quickly that the car skidded and fell over on its side, catching and dragging the youngster beneath it.
