MOTHER IS HYSTERICAL
OVER REPORT OF DEATHMrs. Elva Adams Finds Son
Is Not Drowned

MANY RUMORS CIRCULATE

Canoe Goes Over Spillway and
Upside: Two Occupants are
Able to Reach Shore

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Feb. 27.—Contrary to reports published in a Eugene paper today, Carol Adams of this city was not drowned in the mill race just east of the city limits of Eugene. The lad who perished was Carl Adams, 16-year-old son of Mrs. Nellie Adams.

Mrs. Elva Adams, mother of Carol Adams, 14, and Wilbur, two or three years younger, was hysterical when she heard that her sons were drowned.

Boys Distribute Handbills
She was told that her sons made a trip to the Wendling and Wadsworth districts with Cyril Kay of the Farmers' Exchange store to distribute advertising handbills, but she was not assured of the truth of the statement until J. P. Pulos reached Mr. Kay by telephone.

Various rumors were heard all over town today, some stating that only one person lost his life, and others declaring the number to be three or five. One report that the bodies of two girls were taken from the race, proved groundless when Mrs. Kate Fish, residing about a quarter of a mile below the rapids of the river, reported that she had seen the bodies of two girls who were both excellent swimmers and managed to get a hold on the canoe, and so drifted down the river a quarter of a mile when they managed to reach the shore.

They ran across the fields nearly half a mile to the house of Mrs. G. R. Fish, where the girl was given dry clothing. The young man it was supposed to be the body of Springfield where he had left his car, and when he returned a short time later, he took the girl away with him. Neither told their names, Mrs. Fish said.

GUARD PLAN ENDORSED

EUGENE ARMORY TO BE USED
FOR DRILL OF TROOP

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Feb. 27.—The Springfield chamber of commerce last night endorsed plans for the organization of a headquarters company of the Oregon National Guard in this city.

Major M. B. Huntly and Major F. E. Hamlin presented the matter before the chamber, and were assured the support of that body in supplying means to pay rental for the use of the Eugene armory until January 1, 1927.

Adjutant General White of Salem and Major White of Eugene, who will be in command of the Springfield headquarters company, have signified their approval of the plan, said Major Huntly.

After January 1 of next year, the company will drill here, Major Huntly said.

Other business discussed by the chamber was the report of E. E. Morrison on the work of the bridge committee before the state highway commission. The chamber went into committee to hear the report, and no action was taken.

The proposal to extend the paving on North Fifth street was heard and acted upon, with committee to begin work immediately circulating petitions on the matter.
