## FOURTH SIX-WEEKS PERIOD ENDS FRIDAY

Easter Vacation in Gift School Children Nine Days of Idle Time

Friday will be the end of the fourth six-weeks period of the school year here and grade cards will be issued to all students Monday or Tuesday of next week, it was announced last night by school authorities.

Generally the situation in all institutions of the city is considered better than it was the first six-weeks period of the year, following the extended summer vacation. Fewer pupils in the grades and students in the high schools will "flood out" at the end of this period, it is believed.

Two more major events are on the calendar of the local school system before the summer vacation begins again, after June 4. Easter vacation will begin Monday, April 5, and terminate April 9. This will mean nine days of idleness from classes, counting in the Saturdays and Sundays between April 3 and 11 inclusive.

The last six-weeks period will begin April 19, when grade cards will be issued again, before the final examinations of the year.

## SILENT PRAYER OFFERED

## AUDIENCE AT TEMPLE PRAYS FOR ABSENT SICK

Tonight Dr. Price, Evangelist, Will Preach On "Jonah and the Big Fish."

Silent as the grave is right. It is a prayer for the absent sick. It is an innovation somewhat new to those who believe in divine healing in the way of appointing an hour ahead of time in connection with a revival campaign.

However, a large number of people had been handed in and Dr. Price announced that praying for the absent sick was a regular part of their meetings and letters were here from Washington and California containing names from persons who were aware of this part of the Price campaign program.

At 5 o'clock promptly, as had been announced, Dr. Price called for silent prayer on the part of the audience and as a result fell upon the crowd, one could almost believe that it could be possible for the noise of a pin falling to the floor to be heard. The audience appeared to be greatly moved.

The evangelist in giving out the announcements stated that there would be three services today—at 7, at 8:30 and at 10:30.

Tonight, the evangelist will deliver a sermon on "Jonah and the Big Fish." The speaker at a previous time had told a story of a little boy who saw a picture of Jonah and upon being told by his father that that was foolish, the little boy said: "If that Jonah, I don't blame the fish for throwing him up."

St. John, the first chapter, beginning at the 14th verse, was the sermon topic last evening, wherein it speaks of Jesus going into a certain country and finding a disciple—Philip, who in turn found Nathaniel and told him, "We have found Jesus of Nazareth of whom Moses and the prophets did write."

Dr. Price explained that it was the experience of every Christian that when they found Jesus, He found them. He stated that he believed it poor policy to emulate the example of others—good as they may be—they should follow in the footsteps of Jesus as He gives them light, for did He not say, "Follow me."

He stated that when a man really comes in personal contact with Jesus, he is immediately seized with the missionary spirit. He must tell the good news to others, either as a teacher, or telling it to a crowd. It must come from the heart, and really found Jesus and he knew it experientially and that it is true in the experience of everyone who has been "born again."

Dr. Price made the point that we may know Jesus—not because the Bible says so, but because Jesus says so to the heart. We have a "know so" experience.

It was possible, he said, for a man to know Jesus and yet know nothing about the Bible whatever. When a "down-and-out" finds Jesus, He finds him—it's a mutual discovery.

Speaking of scientific theories he stated that one cannot know Jesus by beginning at the top and working down. Begin at the bottom, "Salvation," he said, "cannot be talked down a man's throat along natural lines—it's a supernatural transaction."

## ARMY EXAM SCHEDULED

## APPLICATIONS FOR COMMISSIONS TO BE RECEIVED

Examinations for commission in the regular army are made open to qualified soldiers and civilians under a war department announcement given out by Corporal Clifford E. Pritchett, in charge of the army recruiting station at the courthouse yesterday. Authorizing the acceptance in the organized reserve of applicants without military experience for the purpose of taking the examinations to be held at Vancouver barracks, Washington, and all army posts throughout the country beginning June 21.

The examinations are to be held to fill approximately 150 vacancies remaining after the 1925 graduation class at West Point is commissioned next June.

Under existing legislation candidates for a regular army appointment are required to be members of the national guard or reserve corps or to be warrant officers or soldiers of the regular establishment. Eligibility is confined to male citizens between 21 and 30 years at time of appointment.

## DATE OF PLAY CHANGED

## MORONI-OLSON PLAYERS TO APPEAR ON MARCH 3

Members of the committee of the Eugene branch of the American association of university women, who are arranging for the last appearance of the Moroni-Olson players in "Friend Hannah" at the Heilig on Wednesday evening, March 3, call the attention of season ticket holders to the change in date of the play. It was originally scheduled at another time, so that the committee is making a special effort to reach everyone concerned.

The play is a dashingly historical romance of the period from about 1760 to 1810, and a number of the

characters in the play are taken from the pages of English history. The story is that of Hannah Lightfoot, a pretty Quaker girl, who became the bride of a handsome young gentleman, only to learn later that she was married to the king of England, George III. How Hannah learns that her beloved young husband is the king, and how she gives him up for his own sake and that of England is told in the third act of the play.

There is tragedy in the play, but it is also rich in comedy, romance and humaneness. Its author, Paul Keeter, nephew of W. D. Howells has not lost his opportunity to include touches of the rhythmic folk lore of the times.

The cast are all members of the company who have played to Eugene audiences before. They are college folk and have many friends among students and towns people.

## LOWER ROAD IS FAVORED

## FALL CREEK PEOPLE CALL UPON COUNTY COURT

The Latah county court was yesterday urged by a delegation of 20 people representing the Fall creek country to eliminate the road over the Jacoby grade, on the Jasper-Lowell road, and to build on the route as already surveyed through the bottom. It was pointed out that Mrs. Jacoby has agreed to donate the right-of-way through the bottom, and the committee urged this route as much the more desirable. The only possible objection, it was asserted, is the possibility of high water, and it was declared by members of the delegation that the river is changing so fast to make this possibility extremely remote.

The court asked the members of the delegation to appoint a committee of five to go over the route on Monday with the county engineer and members of the court, and this was done. The members of the committee chosen are John Schmitt, William Glaspy, C. E. Warner, R. W. Callison and Frank Schmitt. The members of the committee and the county officials will select the most feasible route.

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## STUDENTS TO HOLD SALE

## PROCEEDS OF RUMMAGE GO FOR NEW BUILDING

Fine Arts Structure With Campbell Memorial Court Will Be Built Next Year

The students at the University of Oregon are collecting material for a rummage sale which will be held Saturday, March 6, in the public market, to increase the fund for the new fine arts building which is to be erected on the campus next year.

Under the direction of Miss Frances Morgan, general chairman, and Fred West, associate chairman of the drive, committees are at work and already a large donation has been collected at the Y. W. C. A. bungalow where headquarters for the drive have been established. The material which is being solicited from every living organization on the campus includes hats, shoes, dresses and coats. The clothing will be cleaned and pressed and a price put on each article. Student salesmen and saleswomen will conduct the sale.

The corner stone of the proposed fine arts building, with its beautiful memorial court, is dedicated to the late President Prince L. Campbell, will be laid next year. The architecture designed by Dean Ellis F. Lawrence, of the school of architecture and allied arts, is typical of the ability and dignity of President Campbell's life.

Mrs. George L. Geslinger, who is in charge of raising funds for this building, has expressed her appreciation of the action taken by the student body, as the present fine arts building is neither fireproof nor adequate for the art exhibitions which could otherwise be held here. The Murray-Warner collection of Chinese goods, now on exhibition in the woman's building, will have a more advantageous place in the new building.

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
