JACKSON CITY FAME TO PASS INTO ANNALS

Ashland Said by Dopesters to Have Conceded Selection of New Site to Medford

Glory that was Jackson City's is about to fade into the mist of bygone days, with all the formality of a modern trend, according to the word brought back from the southern part of the state last night by Sheriff Frank E. Taylor. Information is that Ashland has at last conceded to Medford the

county seat of Jackson county, and that at an election to be held during the primaries in May, the ballot will be taken, that in the opinion of those "in the know" will take away from Jackson City once and for all time, the courthouse and its historic situation in the annals of legal history.

The Jackson City courthouse has for years been the bone of contention between Ashland and Medford, both struggling for the name of county seat. Now it has become a necessity that Jackson county either spend about \$100,000 on the old building, or build a new one, and the movement is toward Medford this time.

MUSICAL EVENT CONCLUDES PROGRAM FOR TERM

Jane Thacher and Eugene Carr Appear at School of Music in Concert

The last musical event of the winter term at the university was the joint appearance of Jane Thacher, pianist, and Eugene Carr, baritone, given last evening in the school of music auditorium. This recital was given by Mu Phi Epsilon, national honorary musical fraternity for women.

Eugene Carr, who is a new member of the faculty of music, has a pleasing baritone voice, melodious and clear, as well as a lucid and convincing manner of interpretation. "Amarilli" by Caccini, a thoughtful bit of early Italian; a piece of old English counsel, "When Dull Care," by Richard Leverier; a "Serenade," of delicate charm by Brahms; and "Arm, Arm, Ye Brave," a recitative demanding great interpretative power, comprised the first group of songs by Mr. Carr. As an encore the tender, subdued, "Where E'er You Walk," by Handel was given.

MORE GRAZING OPPOSED

RESOURCES HELD UTILIZED TO FULLEST EXTENT

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, D. C. March 4.—Grazing resources of public domain are now being utilized almost to their fullest extent and any further granting of rights will work against interest of small livestock men of the west, in the view of Vernon Metcalf, director of the national wool growers' association.

Metcalf testifying before the senate public lands committee on the Stanford grazing bill, asserted grazing resources of the national forests have a definite place among the resources of the west and should be regulated in the sensible manner accorded every other resource. The present powers of executive departments over this resource, he said, are little short of autocratic, and a law should be passed which would give a legal status to the granting of grazing privileges.

YOUTHS CONFESS THEFTS

SHERIFF TAYLOR RETURNS FROM MEDFORD

Jackson County Authorities Hold Two Boys for Stealing Three Automobiles

Sheriff Frank E. Taylor returned from Medford last night after an unsuccessful attempt to claim as prisoners Jesse Walton, 19, of Everett, Wash., and Lyle Rossmore, 18, of Marysville in the same state, wanted here for the theft of an automobile.

The boys were arrested in the southern Oregon city by deputy sheriffs recently, in possession of an automobile, the third they had stolen, according to an account of a confession they are said to have made there.

Sheriff Taylor said that the Jackson county authorities had such a strong case against the youths that they were bound over to the grand jury on \$1500 bail each under charges of grand larceny. They stole, it is claimed, one car in Oregon city, abandoning it near Creswell. Walking to Cottage Grove they admitted the theft of a second machine owned by John Miller of Drain. This car was found abandoned at Central Point. They were riding in the Ashland auto when arrested, 15 minutes after the theft, it is reported.

The Lane county charge will be placed before District Attorney John Medley today.
