DAILY MARKET REPORT

Oregon Journal Market Review
PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 5.—Very little change is indicated in the dairy product situation along the Pacific slope. Storage operations in eggs are under headway generally, although the volume of the input is as yet not extensive. Practically all of the storage pack to date has been processed and indications point to a greater volume of such supplies than the plain pack.

Receipts of eggs are very liberal, with an increasing supply being offered from the country despite reports in some quarters that the day had already reached the probable extreme of the season. Demand for farm eggs is especially liberal and considerable of this stock is going into stores.
This season the trade in "dressed" is likely to be much restricted because practically all of the dressed eggs are washing their supplies. The washed egg is not being stored generally, but is being sold for immediate consumption.

Butter Trading Is Unchanged
There was no change in the price of cube butter on the dairy exchange for the session and on the open market trade was practically around the previous level. Prints also unchanged.

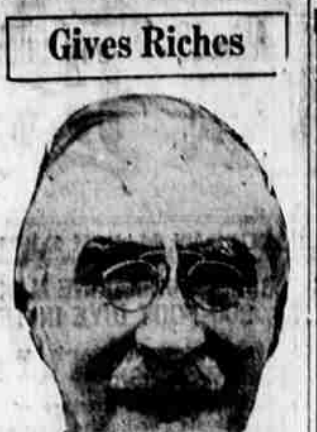
Chicken Prices Again Rising
Further rise in the price of live chickens was shown along the whole coast for the day. Purchases of light hens were around 22¢ and heavy hens were stock at 25¢ to 27¢, the latter being an extreme.

Veal Movement Is Improved
Improved movement of country killed calves was shown for the last 24 hours although prices reflected practically no change. Bulk of the calves moved out at 17¢, the extreme price generally. Hogs were very firm at 14¢ to 15¢ pound.

Halibut Prices Are Lowered
Lower prices are shown for fresh halibut as a result of a very liberal increased movement from Alaska. Trade's estimate of the day's supply is 1400 to 1500 of the business at 30¢ to 32¢ pound.

Freezing Roseburg Broccoli
So liberal have been offerings of home grown broccoli during the last few days that Roseburg stock is being crowded somewhat. Fancy Oregon stock is being offered at 14¢ to 15¢ dozen. Sales of Roseburg stock are around 14¢ to 15¢ a dozen with the bulk at 15¢. Much of the stock only six heads to the crate.
