NEW MEMBERS TO JOIN

REV. MR. BANKS LEAVES BECAUSE OF ILLNESS

Minister Will Rest at Home in Roseburg Before Opening Services in Salem

(Register Lane County Special) SPRINGFIELD, Ore., March 6.—Forty new members will be taken into membership in the Springfield Methodist church Sunday morning, as a result of the work of Rev. Albert Banks, who has been conducting a series of special meetings. Rev. J. T. Moore announced today.

Rev. Mr. Banks left suddenly this morning for his home in Roseburg, when it became evident that unless he discontinued his work at the present time, he would suffer a breakdown. It is thought that after a two-weeks' rest at his home, he will be able to open his engagement at the First Methodist Episcopal church in Salem, March 21.

The evangelist, who is about 70 years of age, held a series of meetings in Springfield 47 years ago. Rev. Mr. Moore, who will have charge of the morning service Sunday, will speak on "Where is the Lord God of Elijah," a topic planned to explain the need for "carrying on" after the work of the evangelist is at an end.

Rev. John A. T. Moore, pastor of the Methodist church at Cottage Grove, will exchange pulpits with Rev. Mr. Moore for the evening service. Miss Dorothy V. Johnson, formerly with the Chicago conservatory of music, will lead the singing, and also give some special numbers.

Rev. Mr. Moore has called an official board meeting to be held at the church at 3:30 Sunday morning, to discuss matters in connection with the revival series.
