

MEN TOLD HOW TO FIGHT CHERRY FLY

C. Mote Speaks At Horticultural Meeting

LYING ADVICE GIVEN

of insect That Is Causing Damage to Crop Traced by Speaker

Interest in Lane county growers at the present time is centered in the meeting of the Lane County Horticultural Association, held at the Chamber of Commerce last night. Professor C. Mote, of the Oregon Agricultural Experiment Station, was the speaker on the subject of the cherry fly. The interesting address was given by Professor Mote, who is a specialist in the study of insects. He pointed out the damage that the cherry fly does to the fruit, and the importance of fighting it. He also gave some advice on how to fight the fly, and the importance of keeping the fruit clean and free from decay.

Professor Mote in his talk on the cherry fly, said that the fly is a pest that is causing damage to the cherry crop. He pointed out that the fly is a small, black, fly-like insect that is about 1/8 of an inch long. It is found in the fruit, and it lays its eggs in the fruit. The eggs hatch and the larvae feed on the fruit, causing it to decay. 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The first spray is made when the flies first appear, which is usually when the Royal Annes begin to show color or from the fifth to the tenth of June. A second spray, one week following the first, and a third spray, one week following the second, are given at these regular intervals. A fourth spray may be necessary if rain occurs immediately following one of the spray applications.

"From one pint to one quart of spray solution is applied to each tree. The spray is applied as fine droplets to the upper surface of the leaves. The foliage of adjacent trees and shrubs should also be sprayed.

All Varieties Are Attacked "All varieties of sweet and sour cherries are subject to attack by this fly. It seems to be a common belief that Royal Annes and some of the early varieties of cherries are free from attack. The fact is that these cherries are 'margotized,' but the grower does not realize it at the time of picking because the margots are very small and inconspicuous. On the fresh fruit market, these margots mature and the cherries are discarded by the disgusted housewife, when the presence of the how conspicuous margot is noted."

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IRREDUCIBLE FUND FOR SCHOOL PICTURES MADE

W. A. Elkins Sponsor of Movement Here

RELIGIOUS ART SOUGHT

Initial Amount Created for Perpetuating the Purchase of Pictures in Eugene

Creating an irreducible fund whereby he hopes to perpetuate the purchase of religious pictures for Eugene public schools, W. A. Elkins, retiring art dealer and pastor of the First Christian church at Pleasant Hill, announced his plans for supplying these pictures, yesterday.

To give the movement a definite start, Mr. Elkins has ordered a large framed picture for each school in the city, and included in the order, the request for pictures to be placed in the two new school buildings that are to be erected this year.

Standard sizes and perfection of the pictures must be maintained, he said. The ultimate object in view is to build up a public school art gallery second to none on the Pacific coast. The general scheme follows a similar ambition fostered by Mr. Elkins two years ago, when the added feature of the fund which he has set aside himself.

May Ask Others to Help Wealthy people of the city may be asked to join Mr. Elkins in this endeavor. The sponsor will add to the fund from time to time and said yesterday that the original amount would be in the neighborhood of \$1000.

By creating the Elkins plan of buying religious pictures for the public schools, the general idea is to form an impression in the mind of the child which may work to two ends, love of classic art and a deeper recognition of the deity through the beauty of picture lessons.

There are a number of these pictures already in schools of Eugene, some of which have been presented by Mr. Elkins through the board of education of which he is a senior member.

J. O. McLAUGHLIN SEEKS STATE SUPERINTENDENCY

Corvallis Public School Head Wants Democratic Nomination; Tells What He Stands For

J. A. McLaughlin, city superintendent of schools at Corvallis who has announced that he will seek the Democratic nomination for the office of state superintendent of public instruction was in Eugene yesterday calling upon friends and local leaders in the Democratic party.

"The outstanding public school problems in Oregon are more moral training in our schools, better rural schools, and the selection of a state superintendent," said Mr. McLaughlin.

"My profession is an educator—not a politician. My educational and professional preparation has been both broad and intensive. Within the past four years I have studied with several of the greatest educational authorities in the world. My experience has been extended from that of a rural school teacher to that of a college instructor, including 20 years of administrative work. I have been continuously engaged in educational work in Oregon for 17 years, nine years at Hood River, and eight years at Corvallis.

"I believe: (a) That schools must emphasize moral training and law observance; (b) That the rural school deserves the largest consideration; (c) That school text books can be secured from the publishers at a lower price; (d) That both vocational and academic educations are essential; (e) That teachers should be adequately trained; (f) That schools are the safeguards for a Democratic system of government."

CANADIAN SOLDIERS TO MEET IN APRIL

Local Man Is Delegate to Meeting in Vancouver, B. C., to Observe Anniversary
