EUGENE QUINTET WILL
PLAY AGAINST DALLESFirst Tournament Game to
Be Friday Morning

State basketball tournament contest rules were announced yesterday afternoon, following the drawing of opponents for the first round by Governor Walter M. Pierce.

Eugene players will not go on the floor at Salem until Friday morning when they will play The Dalles. Following are the schedules:

Thursday, 4 p. m.—Marshallfield vs. Medford; 7:30 p. m. Baker vs. Astoria; 8:30 p. m. Salem vs. Hillsboro.

Friday, 9:30 a. m.—Eugene vs. The Dalles; 10:30 a. m. McLaughlin vs. winner Marshallfield-Medford; 7:30 p. m. winner Baker-Astoria vs. winner Salem-Hillsboro; 8:30 p. m. winner Eugene-The Dalles vs. winner Marshallfield-Medford-McLaughlin.

The finals between the winner of McLaughlin-Marshallfield-Medford, Eugene, and The Dalles, against the winner of Baker-Astoria, Salem and Hillsboro, will be held Saturday night at 8:30 o'clock. Winners in the finals will be awarded first place in the tournament, and runners-up in the same game will be placed second.

The second round, to determine third and fourth places, will begin Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The opening tilt of the second round will be between loser of the Medford-Marshallfield clash vs. the loser of the Eugene-The Dalles game.

The winning team in the second round will be given third place in the tournament, and the runner-up will be placed fourth.

The tournament is so arranged that any team eliminated from the first round will automatically enter the second round, no matter at what stage of the first round the team is eliminated.

In comparison with eight other teams to be in the final test, Eugene players are inexperienced. Coleman was the only regular last year, who was not graduated. Barnes won his letter by getting a chance to play in the state meet. Names of the players were sent to Coach Hahn of Willamette university yesterday. In the list, Coach E. G. Brown included Gerald Towne, William Pittman, Austin Cobert and Christ Chastain. In addition to the regular five, either Cobert or Chastain will not be taken, the coach said as only eight players are allowed each team. Hope is held out by Coach Brown and other school officials for a good showing in the state title meet. The local quintet has rounded into a strong aggregation since the defeat at the hands of the Medford team, which will also be at the tourney.

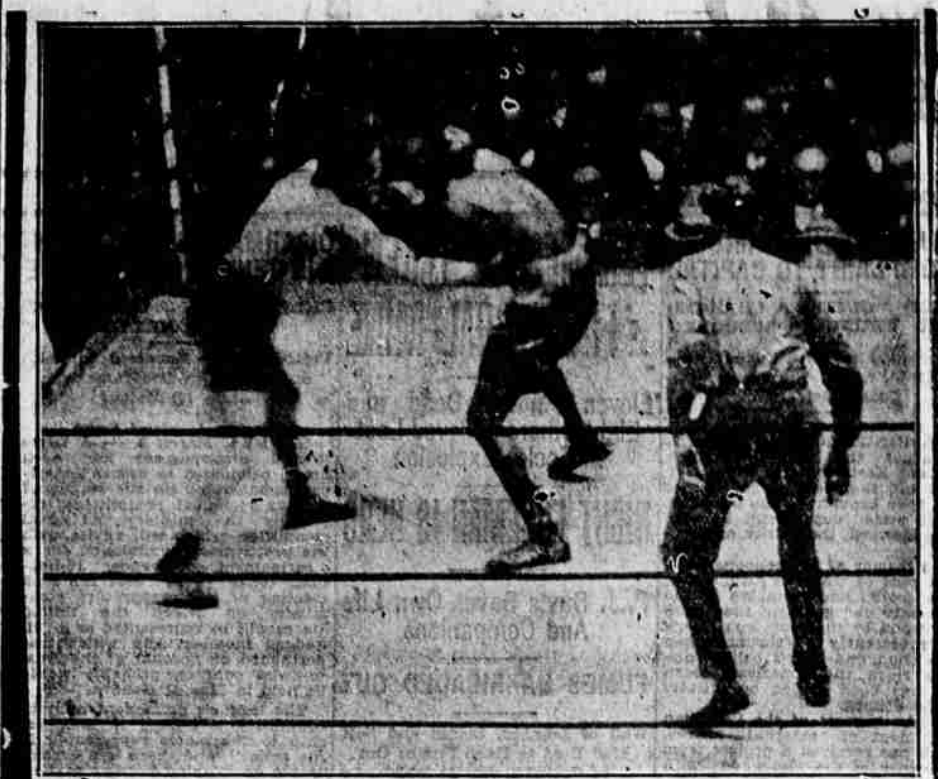

FISH WHEELS OPPOSED
SALMON IN COLUMBIA RIVER
DECLARED SCARCE

PORTLAND, Ore., March 9.—Unanimous opposition to fish wheels in the Columbia river on the ground that they are mainly responsible for the depletion of the salmon run in the upper Columbia and tributaries was embodied in a resolution prepared at the monthly meeting of the state fish commission here today.

The resolution also criticized the use of gill nets of too extreme a length in upper Columbia fishing operations, and recommended legislation making fishing with wheels in the Columbia unlawful, closing the river above Cascade locks to fishing after August 25 and prohibiting the use of any gill net more than 250 fathoms long in any part of the river and its tributaries.

ROADHOUSE PLANS MADE
THEATRE NEAR CORVALLIS
MAY RUN ON SUNDAY

SALEM, Ore., March 9.—Plans for the erection of a modern theatre, roadhouse and a dancing pavilion near the Willamette river, and outside the city limits of Corvallis were discussed here today by J. E. Beeman and Fred Orr of Portland, who were in Salem investigating the state laws regulating the operation of moving picture theatres and roadhouses in Oregon outside of incorporated cities and towns.

A Corvallis city ordinance prohibits the showing of motion pictures in that town on Sunday and in an election last week the proposal to restore Sunday films was voted down. Mr. Beeman said that the moving picture theatre being

planned would be open four nights a week, including Sundays.

Timber Held Under-Taxed

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., March 9.—Believing Klamath timber lands to be under-taxed, the county court late yesterday awarded Edgar and Callison of Portland, a contract to reculture 190,000 acres of pine. The work will be done for 16¢ an acre. Large timber companies, including the Long-Bell and the Weyerhaeuser firms, entered violent protest against the action.

COMETS MAKE REPLY TO
CHARGE FROM WENDLINGWar All Over, Basketball
Chasers Proclaim

Comets have been made the innocent victims of an edit of the Lane county basketball league officers, and are wondering if Wendling 41 players know "the war is over."

Following a stormy protest against the decision to arrange a three game play-off for the county hoop title between the Comets and Hounds, voiced by the Wendling team yesterday, George Mason, secretary of the league and manager of the Comet quintet, penned the following letter:

"In regard to the Wendling article of March 9, the Comets wish the public to definitely know why the game between them and Wendling was postponed.

"First the original game was postponed by Wendling when some of their players were laid up with injuries, and as the high school team played on the same night, which necessitated a postponement or a forfeit. However, this was overlooked by the Comets because the Hounds had postponed a game with Wendling for the same reason earlier in the season.

"The game was then set up for Wednesday of the next week and up until the night before the Comets were expecting to journey to Wendling. They had made arrangements for the trip when Wendling 'phoned down again and wished to postpone the game.

"According to league officials the action by Wendling did not seem like they wanted to play the game, so a three-game series with the Hounds was arranged so it would not force the Hounds to keep in training so long after the basketball season had ended.

"As for the Comets playing on the Wendling floor, they say it has been done and could be done again."

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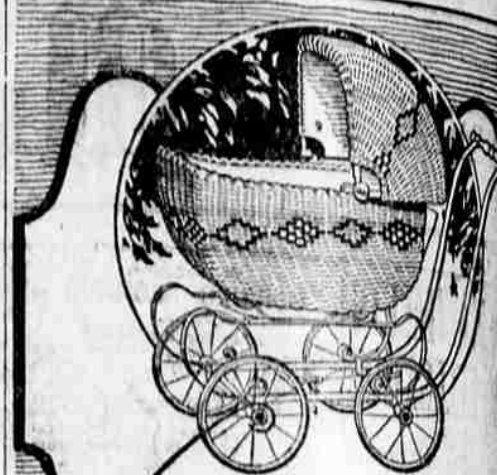
