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TAX ROLLS TURNED OVER FOR 1925 COLLECTION

Total Collectible More Than \$1,800,000 This Year

NEW ITEMS ARE ON LIST

Cox Drainage District and Special Levy for Extension of Squirrels Included

A total of \$1,849,107.78 taxes is collectible on the 1925 rolls turned over to Sheriff Taylor yesterday by County Assessor Keeney. This is nearly \$40,000 more than appeared on the 1924 rolls, the total for that year being \$1,791,131.14.

Collection of taxes will begin about the fifth of April, which is about a month later than heretofore as the law has been changed providing for an extension of delinquency on the first half from April 5 to May 5.

The warrant for the turning over of the tax rolls was issued yesterday by County Clerk Bryson and the assessor immediately transferred the books from his office to those of the sheriff and a large force of women was put to work writing tax statements to be mailed out to property owners throughout the county.

The assessor's collections on unsecured personal property thus far have amounted to \$159,339.29. Two new special tax items—that of the Cox drainage district and that for extermination of gray squirrels—appear on the rolls this year for the first time. The drainage tax is paid only by property owners in the district, which is located west of Junction City in the Long Tom bottom.

DYMENTS TOUR EUROPE

TRAVEL HAS DISADVANTAGES WRITES DEAN

French Rubber Collars Uncomfortable on American Neck, Is Judgment of Traveler

European travel has its disadvantages, according to a letter received by Mrs. J. M. Miller, assistant instructor in the school of architecture and allied arts at the University of Oregon, from Dean and Mrs. Colin V. Dymont, who are spending a part of their year's leave of absence in Europe.

Recently the dean found his supply of clean collars exhausted, and he was forced to purchase a French rubber collar, which he found very uncomfortable on an American neck. He will be glad, he writes, when the party arrives at Toulouse, where their baggage is awaiting them.

The Dymonts have been in Paris for some time. Mrs. Dymont and Mary H. Perkins, professor in the English department, also on leave, report that recently they looked over the new spring style. The Dymonts have made an extended tour throughout France and Italy, and now they are in Vienna. They intend soon to leave for Prague, where they will remain for a month or two. They expect to sail for home the latter part of June.
