THOMSON'S RESORT TO LEASE HUNTING LODGES

Popular McKenzie Host Plans Home Sites

Resort home sites adjacent to Thomson's summer resort on the McKenzie river will be opened shortly, under a plan announced here yesterday by Carey Thomson and his four sons.

A large tract of land will be thrown open and the ultimate program is to erect small cottages at appropriate intervals which will be leased to fishermen and vacationists on the government plan such as is in operation in the forest reserve, it was said.

Mr. Thomson was in Eugene yesterday completing details. The land to be opened is on Madron creek, a tributary to the McKenzie river.

During the next four Sundays before the fishing season opens, Mr. Thomson and his sons, will give free boat rides on the river to guests of the resort.

Thomson's place is 33 miles from Eugene, across the river at a point three miles above the fish hatchery. Several are one of the drawing cards to this hotel and camp grounds.

FISHING SEASON OPENS APRIL 15, FOR TROUT

No New Streams Closed By Game Commission

Fishing season will be ushered in April 15, with the usual stream open to followers of the creed of Isaac Walton.

All trout fishing on all of the rivers and creeks that have been waded by Lane county sportsmen the last 10 years are included on the calendar, it was pointed out yesterday.

Considerable confusion has arisen over the recent declaration of the state game commission in which a list of closed areas was given, said a local authority last night. The streams closed by edict, he said, have been closed for 10 years, and no fishermen will suffer in Lane county for lack of water.

No new streams were closed by the order of the commission.

SHOOT RETURNS GIVEN OREGON WOMEN BREAK EVEN MEN LOSE IN AREA

Returns from the telegraphic rifle shoots in which University of Oregon teams competed last week show that the women's team won from the Northwestern university by the score of 985 to 893 and lost to Syracuse university, 985 to 954. The men's team took seventh place in the ninth corps area competition, in which 18 units of R. O. T. C. were shooting. The chance to compete in the national intercollegiate rifle meet, which is to be held soon, was lost by seven points, according to the returns.

Both teams finished their season's schedule with last week's shooting. The girls scored consistently high in their last competition. Individual totals ranging from 85 to 95. Gladys Bristol was the high scorer. During the season the girls have won six and lost five matches. Complete returns for the men have not been received as yet.

Pacific college authorities will provide quarters and Miss Marsters is anxious to get in touch with local people who will provide automobiles for transportation. COLONEL COOLIDGE LOSES LAST FIGHT

and might live only a few hours.

Just before leaving the executive mansion, he talked by telephone to the nurse on duty at the home of Colonel Coolidge and was advised there had been little change during the day in his father's condition. Arrangements were made to keep the president informed at way stops as to developments.

President and Mrs. Coolidge left the White House late in the afternoon as thousands of government employees were on their way home from work. Hundreds of soldiers watched them enter their automobile, which had difficulty worming its way through congested traffic to Union station.

Three Secretaries Kellogg and Hoover were waiting with Secretaries Standen to bid them farewell. Mrs. Coolidge was dressed entirely in black. The president wore a light overcoat. A light was necessary for comfort in the almost springlike weather which prevailed in Washington.

Considerable baggage was taken aboard the train in anticipation of near zero weather in Vermont.

As soon as he reached Woodstock, Vt., 15 miles from Plymouth, at dawn, Automobiles will be in readiness to take the party on at least the first stage of ride over snow-piled roads to the Cross Roads hamlet.

Late information was that the road between Woodstock and Plymouth had been cleared for auto travel although the last mile or two might have to be traveled in horse-drawn sleighs.

The journey the president started today is his second to his father's bedside. Last summer, just after he had arrived at Swampscott, he made a hurried trip to Plymouth to be with the aged man who had undergone a serious operation.

In addition to the usual body-guard of secret service men, 15 newspapermen and several photographers are traveling with the president. On his arrival here the president was handed the latest Associated Press dispatches from Plymouth, showing his father's condition unchanged.

LIGHT LAW IS ATTACKED

MOVEMENT FOR REPEAL OF MEASURE STARTED

(By The Associated Press) SALEM, Ore., Mar. 18.—A movement to repeal the state motor vehicle certificate of title law enacted by the 1925 legislature, was launched here today when an initiative measure was filed in the office of the secretary of state. The measure has been referred to the attorney general for ballot title.

The Oregon Automotive, which Joe Dunn of Portland, president, is sponsoring the initiative measure. It was indicated also that the newly enacted motor vehicle lighting law might come under fire and that a repeal would be sought. The law provides for state regulation of lighting equipment and for dynamo on wet pavement.

LA GRANDE WILL VOTE

PEOPLE TO AOT ON LARGER CITY COMMISSION

(By The Associated Press) LA GRANDE, Ore., March 18.—The city commission last night decided to ask La Grande voters to express an opinion at the polls, May 21, as to whether the city charter should be amended to enlarge the commission from three to five members, four from wards and one at large. The step came in answer to a petition signed by more than 70 taxpayers. Another petition opposing the request, bears more than three-score signatures. At present the three commissioners are elected at large.
