

"LAND CRUISE LINERS"

TO BE PUT ON BY S. P.

Luxurious Cars to Be Built
For Tourists

TO BE USED THIS SUMMER

Theatre, Gymnasium, Baths and
Other Comforts to Be
Provided

The ultra-modern in railroad transportation, eight "land-cruise liners" equipped with moving picture theatres, gymnasiums, dance floors, plus all the comforts and conveniences of a luxurious hotel, will "cruise" through Oregon this summer, according to John M. Scott, assistant passenger traffic manager for the Southern Pacific company.

Providing superlative private train service for visitors to the Northwest, these trains will be made up of nice or more specially constructed cars, two types of which are unique in railway car design.

Beds instead of berths, suites of rooms with overstuffed furniture and private baths, communicating drawing room and compartments, lounges and club rooms will make possible all the luxuries of the famous houseboats of the Nile.

Passengers from the East and Middle West will make these trains their home for 28 day voyages through the beauty lands of the West, going "ashore" at various Oregon and Washington "ports of call" to stop overnight at famous hotels, or go sightseeing in automobiles.

"The object of this enterprise," Mr. Scott said, "is to see if a new class of travel cannot be created by offering luxurious accommodations comparable to the de luxe cabins on Atlantic ocean liners. The 21 cars required are being built by Pullman company at a cost of approximately \$1,000,000. The trains will be of much benefit to Oregon and the West as they will bring us a class of tourists who are now spending many of their vacations in Europe and in expensive around-the-world tours.

The first land cruise to Oregon under the management of Raymond and Whitehead, will leave New York June 2, passing through Eugene June 18 over the Shasta route.

PH.D. DEGREE AWARDED

Dr. Kellems has been a student at Edinburgh since last fall. The degree has not been conferred, but will be within a few days. It was indicated in the message to his mother here.

Following the work at the Scottish university the doctor and his wife will travel to the Palestine where they will attend a three-weeks' convention of world archaeologists. From thence they will go to South Africa, on a mission among the white people, and will complete a tour around the world in another year.

have been spread far and wide, have caused much comment abroad. He led the state department to demand in a formal statement that Mr. Houghton had not opened his mind about Europe to "any unofficial person."

Attack Is Continued

Senator Harrison did not attempt to explain the incident entirely, but he hinted that the ambassador might have made his observations in the belief that his name would not be connected with them.

Then, extending his attack to President Coolidge and Secretary Kellogg, the Mississippi senator suggested there must have been some conspiracy between "Careful Cal" and "Nervous Nellie" and "Gloomy Gus." This aroused Senator Foran, Republican, Ohio, who lampooned Senator Harrison for criticizing the ambassador. Mr. Foran concluded he had no information whether Ambassador Houghton gave a confidential interview to the correspondents but added that he did not depend upon the press for his information.

Senator Borah told the senate that from the brief interview he had with Ambassador Houghton the facts as published did not differ from the picture as it has been given by the press of London, France and the United States.

"There is no doubt as to the seriousness of the situation as presented by Ambassador Houghton," Senator Borah said. "I doubt not at all that it was stated correctly. The president and the secretary of state had a right to know the facts. I wish the American people could have them, and without any trimmings."
