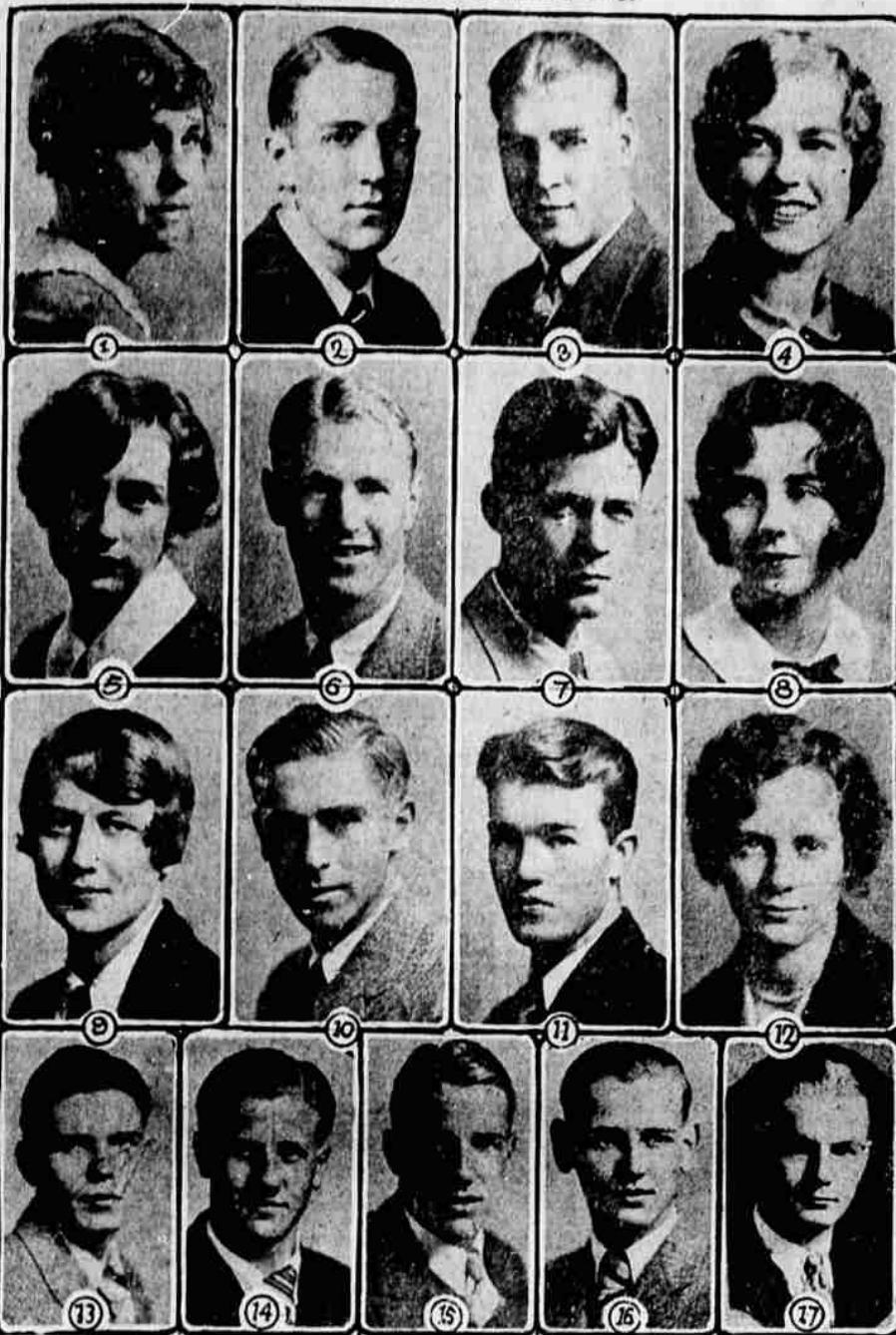


STUDENT HEADS PICKED AT U. O.
