

TWO OTHER BISHOPS TO FACE CHURCH TRIBUNAL

Is Accused of Withholding Facts in Bast Case

NEW CHARGES HELD UP

Bishops John L. Nuelson and Edgar Blake Accused of Seeking to Shield Bast

KANSAS CITY, May 10.—(AP)—Civil difficulties in Denmark in 1924 that brought Bishop Anton East of Copenhagen to trial before an ecclesiastical court of the Methodist Episcopal church here in an important conduct charges, today found two additional Methodist bishops drawn into the case.

Bishops John L. Nuelson of Zurich, Switzerland, and Edgar Blake of Park have been charged with withholding facts in the Bast case. In a complaint filed with the conference secretary by the Rev. Andrew W. Shamel of Pasadena, Calif. The new charges were held up pending a verdict in the Bast case. It was announced and likely will be dropped if the church court clears the accused bishop.

Bishops Blake and Nuelson are charged with withholding information in reporting to church officials in American on the outcome of the civil trial of Bishop East in Copenhagen in 1925.

Charged With Funds Misuse

Bishop East was found guilty at that time of charges involving alleged misuse of church funds and served three months in jail, subsequently he was suspended by a church tribunal at The Hague pending a trial before the general conference, which is now in session. The trial opened a week ago but has been held in secret and its progress has not been reported.

Bishops Blake and Nuelson have been staunch defenders of their brother European bishop. Unification is favored.

Adjournment today halted debate on a resolution asking that the church authorize a single commission of 27 members to represent the Methodist church in the movement of unification with the Presbyterian churches the Congregationalist church and other denominations. A committee report, unanimously recommending the appointment of the commission was brought before the conference.

Granting to central conferences the right to elect native bishops was called unconstitutional today by the judiciary committee and a commission was chosen to investigate constitutional changes necessary to carry out the program. Methodists in India, China and South America have requested permission to name their own bishops.

REGISTRATION IS 317,491

REPUBLICANS HAVE 222,139; DEMOCRATS 83,304

SALEM, May 10.—(AP)—Oregon has a registration of 317,491. Republicans and 83,304 Democrats for the May 18 primaries, according to a registration tabulation prepared today by Secretary of State Foster on the basis of reports made to him by the several counties.

Progressive register 271, prohibitionists 926, socialists 1319 and miscellaneous 9388, making a total registration of 317,491.

Multnomah county's registration totals 101,319 including 73,842 Republicans and 24,571 Democrats. Marion county has the second largest registration in the state, a total of 22,763.

KELLEY DOOMED TO DIE

GOVERNOR YOUNG REFUSES TO INTERFERE

SACRAMENTO, Cal., May 10.—(AP)—Governor Young this afternoon refused to interfere in the case of Clarence "Buck" Kelley sentenced to be hanged at San Quentin tomorrow morning. After giving careful attention to argument by Milton T. U'ren, who sought commutation of the sentence, the California executive gave out a statement in which he said:

"If there was ever a case deserving the death penalty, this is one."

In his statement the governor briefly reviewed the story of the shooting orgy in San Francisco on the night of October 11 when Kelley participated in eight holdups and shot six persons, three of whom died.

MANY ENTRIES FOR HI MEET AT OREGON STATE

More Than 400 Athletes to Compete at Corvallis

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 10.—

(AP)—Preparations are being made to handle more than 400 high school athletes at the second annual high school track meet here Saturday. With 43 Oregon high schools entered and practically all entry lists that athletes filed already, it looks like the record entry of 346 competitors last year may be bettered by 60 or 70 this season.

Practically all the high schools entered have competed in some meet this year which gives an indication of their strength. Not much may be gained from these district meets in the way of judging team strength since the various first point winners are so likely to be widely scattered among schools in the state meet.

Several schools are sending only one, two or three of their favorite sons, while others have a dozen or more. Since all the athletes have conformed with qualifications laid down for entrance, that includes a certain necessary maximum performance it means that the cream of the high school track talent is going to be on hand to take a crack at the existing records.

AGREE ON MARINE BILL

SENATE AND HOUSE CONFERENCE ADJUST DIFFERENCES

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 10.

(AP)—Tentative agreement has been reached by senate and house conferees on the merchant marine shipping bill to the house, provision permitting sale of vessels hereafter with the consent of five of the seven members of the shipping board. The senate bill would have required unanimous consent of the shipping board for sale of government vessels. It was contended this amounted to a policy of government ownership and operation of the merchant marine fleet which President Coolidge has urged be put into private hands as rapidly as possible.

The conferees are still apart however on some minor differences between the two measures. A final agreement is looked for at another meeting called for tomorrow.

Lumber Mill Orders Gain

PORTLAND, Ore., May 10.—(AP)—Orders received by 113 mills of the West Coast Lumbermen's association in the week ending May 4 totaled \$4,646,757 feet, it became known today, setting a new record for all time. The previous record, established the week ending March 24, was \$4,073,765 feet.

My Fellow-Citizens of Lane County:

WARNED of an eleventh-hour attack, and your spirit of fair play, I respectfully submit to you which prove that my Wet opponents and their thizers are unreliable curbstone advisers to the my personal record.

I came to Eugene in 1911, attended high school, graduated in the class of 1912. During that time, president of the high school Boys' Club, and later, president of the University Chapter of the Epworth League. My brother Ralph and I were in business in Eugene. I succeeded my brother as circulation manager of the Morning Register. Resigning, I went to Alaska, where I was employed on the Alaska Daily Empire. From Alaska to Astoria in 1918, awaiting my call, due the following fall, I went to work and 3 years as circulation manager of the Evening Star, resigning to become Chief Field Deputy, on the work, under the present Sheriff of Clatsop County, ley J. Slusher. I resigned with a good record, accepted the position of Field Director of the National Enforcement League. The headquarters of the League were in Portland, but I re-established my residence in Eugene, where the first field work of the League, my direction was done, beginning October 4, 1921, then I have served personally in 180 arrest cases, 3000 days in prison sentences. While my duties have compelled me to travel constantly about the State (in all of the counties), in and out of Lane County, working finally out of the Portland headquarters, Eugene at time has been my home—the only place in the where I have established a residence since leaving home more than four years ago.

In all of this work I have been defending your fighting for your welfare, while necessarily depriving the comforts of my own home in Eugene. I have lived in harness, in my automobile. My principal pension has been that highest of all pay—satisfaction in duties faithfully performed. While this work throughout the State, I gained an experience that can be acquired only by actual field work, direct contact with criminals, their capture and prosecution. Sheriff with this experience—intimate knowledge of conditions throughout the State—is better qualified for effective work than one having only a local experience is the common practice of States, counties and municipalities to send public officials to conventions, and to gatherings, at public expense, for the purpose of learning more about State-wide conditions and affairs. The experience thus gained is regarded as a great advantage to the taxpayers. I have acquired years of experience exact kind that a Sheriff needs—and at my own expense.

HAVE AIDED TAXPAYERS

I also have been warned that my opponents will attempt to question my status as a taxpayer. I have been paying taxes on real estate, except indirectly, have paid a large sum total in gasoline tax on my car of about 130,000 miles in the last 3½ years, since my licence was established in Eugene. Besides, during time I have saved the taxpayers of Lane County, of for them, more than \$16,000, and for the State of Oregon as a whole more than one hundred thousand dollars in fines and forfeitures paid in through the county treasury. This was an enforced, personal collection, all made none delinquent. Let my opponents compare their records with mine, as to taxpaying and personal achievement.

I wish to emphasize again that Eugene is my home and has been for several years and I am proud of my county. It was here that I began life as a taxpayer, served here on the election board in 1912, as a judge of the Progressive Party. Here I cast my first vote for President of the United States, for Theodore Roosevelt.

WET PROPAGANDA NAIRED

Wet curbstone gossips have been mouthing a tale "planted" liquor in a man's car in order to arrest that is a malicious lie of whole cloth. They also say that I have been mixed up in shootings. That also wicked lie of whole cloth. I have always been opposed any reckless or unjustifiable use of firearms. I have been compelled to "rough" men who resisted arrest and deserved it, but I have never employed or worked anyone who ever shot anybody, and personally I have carried a gun, while serving in hundreds of arrests, and I have disarmed many gun-packers who were acting about as "bad men."

I assure you that I am not over-zealous, nor law in any way. I am, however, firm and uncompromising law enforcement work, which, I maintain, should be entrusted only to friends of the law. I believe wholeheartedly in the 18th Amendment, and declare that "source of supply" is always found under the cork, that one drinker is no better than another. Personally I have never tasted liquor in my life.

IMPROVED SERVICE PLANNED

In the appointment of new deputies, under the organization, I will pick the best and bravest men available in the county, giving careful consideration to applications. I will see to it that their pride in appearance, as in character and ability, shall be placed to the people. I will not employ convicted law-breakers to catch their fellow criminals.

The Sheriff's office should have one general entrance with the tax department, criminal section and jail consolidated, so that it won't be like finding the maze on a circus lot. I will avoid irregularities and inefficiency by putting all moneys under the care of a competent cashier.

I will provide a private conference room for the citizens and visiting officials who have confidential business with the Sheriff.

I will compile a weekly financial report, showing exactly the condition of business, and will report receipts daily, to earn maximum interest.

By the consolidation of the services, now separately would save the salaries of three deputies (more than \$5000 a year) and give far better service.

On taking office as Sheriff I will ask that all assets and be checked by an expert accountant, so the new system may be properly established. My aim will be to give, by improved methods, the most efficient and satisfactory service, recognizing municipal constabulary jurisdiction.
