

COAST AWAITS FAVORS OF JONES-WHITE BILL

Shipbuilding Program Held
Contingent on Adoption

MYERS OUTLINES PLANS

Construction Plans Involve Ex-
penditure of \$32,000,000 For
Merchant Ships, He Says

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., May 11.—(AP)—Pacific coast shipbuilding programs amounting to \$32,000,000 contingent on passage of the Jones-White merchant marine bill were announced here today by

Jefferson Myers of Portland, Ore., member of the shipping board. Myers and E. C. Plummer, vice chairman of the shipping board, were guests here at a commercial club lunch. Both said they believed the bill, which permits government loans for private ship construction will pass. Myers declared passage of the bill is so certain that the shipping board already has entered into negotiations on behalf of the lines which are preparing to expand.

Myers outlined the \$32,000,000 program as follows:
Four combined passenger, freight and mail liners to be built by operators of one of the existing trans-Pacific lines to the Orient at an estimated cost of \$1,750,000 each.

Six Lines Proposed
Six combined freight and passenger liners to be operated from Pacific coast ports through the Panama canal to Europe and which will cost \$2,500,000 each. Three passenger liners to be built by the Matson Navigation company for the San Francisco-

Australia run, which will cost about \$5,000,000 each. Ten freight ships to replace vessels of three trans-Pacific lines recently sold by the shipping board to private interests and which will cost about \$1,500,000 each.

His Recital Is Halted
The former Iowa representative prefaced his recital of figures with a lengthy review of what the Hoover organization set out to do several months ago and its accomplishments. Senator McMaster, Republican, South Dakota, interrupted several times to say the committee did not want to hear a "campaign speech in favor of the commerce secretary, but wanted to get to the real facts regarding the financing of his campaign."

Upon the completion of his prepared statement, Good was questioned for more than half an hour by the senate investigators.

Asserting that every penny that had been spent on Hoover's behalf had been spent economically, the one time member of congress declared that Hoover supporters had been confronted with the task of overcoming false reports concerning their candidate.

Asked if these reports had been circulated entirely by Hoover's opponents for the Republican presidential nomination, Good said that

some of the candidates for the Democratic nomination had been active in this regard.

"What were those charges?" inquired Senator Barkley, Democrat, Kentucky.

"There were a number," Good replied. "One was that Mr. Hoover was not an American citizen."

"What were some of the other reports you had to combat?" "That Mr. Hoover was not a Republican."

"You had to spend a great deal of money to convince the public that he was a Republican?" Barkley pursued.

"It was contended that of his own free will he had entered the Michigan primary of 1920 as a Democrat," the witness replied. "That was disproved. It was said that he made a fortune out of the Boxer rebellion. That was disproved."
