TWO RECORDS BROKEN

Steve Anderson Collects 14 Points For High Honors; Oregon Takes 2 Firsts

The University of Washington didn't have much trouble in the dual track and field meet with the University of Oregon at Hayward field yesterday. With the score, 94 1/2 to 36 1/2. Of course, the defeat was anticipated, so that the blow to the Weibos was softened. However, no plans were made for allowing Washington to walk away with 12 of a possible 15 first places, nor were any arrangements made for the invading Huskies to set two new Pacific northwest records. And that's what happened.

The records were made by Steve Anderson in the high hurdles and by Herm Brix in the shot put. Anderson trotted off the 120-yard dash in 14 1/2 seconds, bettering the old mark by a tenth of a second—and he did this while the wind whipped in his face, and after he had just taken a third place in the 100-yard dash. Herm Brix narrowly approached a world record in the shot, tossing the iron ball 59 feet 9 1/2 inches, set by Hauser of Stanford, as well as established a new northwest record. Brix himself held the northwest mark with a throw of 48 feet 7 1/2 inches made last week in the meet at Seattle. Though his new distance improved upon the coast mark, it will not stand as official, since conference records can be broken only in the annual conference meet.

Anderson High Point Man

Anderson was the outstanding man of the meet, competing in four events and placing in all of them. He took two firsts, both of them in the hurdles, a second in the high jump and a third in the 100-yard dash. He amassed a total of 14 points for individual honors.

The meet started off badly for the Weibos when Washington made a clean sweep of the first three events, a handicap of nine points to overcome. The handicap never overcame, but gradually mounted until at the end of the first four races the count was 33 to 3.

Oregon's two first places were made in the javelin and the high jump. Victor Wetzel, Weibos captain, taking the former and Ralph McCulloch the other. Wetzel threw the spear 177 feet 3 inches. McCulloch beat Steve Anderson out in the jump with the leap of 6 feet 2 inches. Anderson cleared the bar at 6 feet, but could not quite make the higher mark.

Crowley Gets Tie

In a third event the Weibos tied with Washington for first. Crowley breaking even with Nichols of the Huskies in the pole vault. The two successfully cleared the bar at 11 feet 9 inches, but could not shove higher. Crowley, the Huskies' pole vaulter, came as a surprise. It was nothing compared with the surprise that Herb Kelly, a certain of the first place, if not a clean sweep, in all of the hurdle races. Kelly was even with Brodie of Washington when the two cleared the last hurdle, but with a pretty sprint, he ahead to take second by a foot.

Washington took not only 12 first places, but more than half the points in all but two events. Oregon took a first and tied for first in the high jump to win 5 1/2 to 2 1/2 points in that event and won first and second to win, 8 to 1 in the javelin. In every other event the Huskies took a majority of the points.

Smith of Washington and Standard of Oregon furnished the most exciting struggle of the day in the 440-yard dash, finishing in almost a dead heat. Standard led by half a stride at the home stretch, but Smith drew abreast of him just at the tape and squeezed ahead to capture first by a bare two inches. So great was the effort expended in this race that Standard in the mile relay lost 15 yards before the first pass of the batons and cost the race. The Weibos relay team was considered one of Oregon's strongest bids for points.
