Members are requested to wear house dresses, and plan to arrive in Cottage Grove by 12:30 p. m.

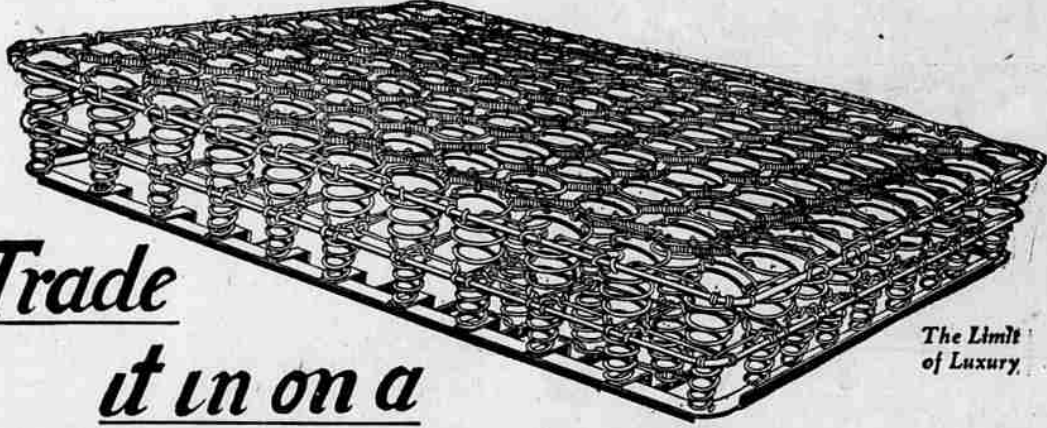

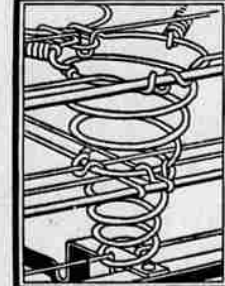
