Girls Team Is Chosen.

The girls' baseball team of the eighth grade was selected Monday after school. It is to play in the interclass games for the school championship. 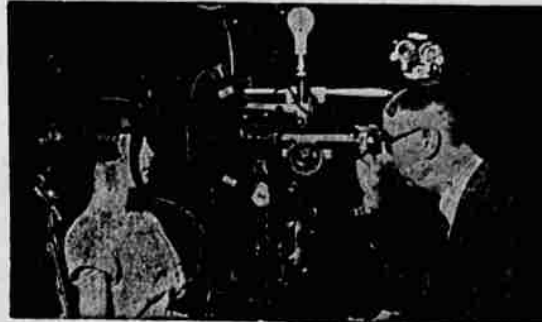
