FOREST FIRE FIGHTING PLANS FOR SEASON MADE

Central Dispatch System Will Be Used

LOOKOUT PEAKS CHOSEN

Foster Steele, Fire Assistant of Cascade Forest, Will Be at Oakridge

Fire protection for the Cascade national forest during the coming season will be operated under a central dispatching system instead of each district acting independently as has been the practice in previous years. This was announced by Foster Steele, fire assistant of the forest who will act as central dispatcher with headquarters at Oakridge during the fire season.

Eleven primary lookout points will be manned about July 1. A primary lookout point is a high peak or mountain commanding a wide expanse of territory upon which a lookout tower equipped with a fire flinder, telephone and living quarters has been constructed. Trained men will occupy these points throughout the season watching for fires.

When a smoke is discovered the lookout will telephone the central dispatcher, giving him the location of the fire as determined by his fire flinder. The primary lookout points have been selected with a view of having all parts of the forest under the observation of at least two lookouts. In this way cross shots are obtained on fires and it will be possible to ascertain their location more accurately.

24 Firemen on Hand Twenty-four firemen and patrolmen will be stationed throughout the forest, Mr. Steele says. In addition to these patrolmen and fire-

men there will be road and trail crews working at different places on the forest. These crews will be organized into firemen who can act independently or in groups as the occasion may demand.

The forest service has learned by experience that the secret of success in preventing large fire losses each year is to get men to the fires as soon after they start as possible. If a fire can be reached by one or two men while it is still small it can usually be extinguished with small loss of timber and comparatively little cost. If it is given a chance to spread before being reached it may burn over hundreds of acres and cost thousands of dollars to control.

District Rangers Smith L. Taylor of the McKenzie district, H. C. Hatt at Reserve, and C. H. MacFarland and his assistant ranger, Paul S. Pieper, at Oakridge will have charge of the protective forces on their respective districts. They will see that the organization functions properly and will periodically go to as many fires as their time will permit.

Broadcasting Is Planned Radio station KORE will cooperate with the Cascade national forest during the coming season and broadcast information relative to weather conditions and instructions to men who are out of telephone communication.

The airplane fire patrol will be done by private parties under contract with the forest service instead of by the government planes as has been done in the past. Eugene usually go to as many fires as their time will permit.
