Benefield, graduate manager, stated yesterday. The Webfoots have lost but one conference game so far this season and that to the University of Washington aggregation in a two game series held here May 4 and 5. The Webfoots have trounced the O. A. C. ball team three straight games in the last two weeks. In the series with the Husky team held here Oregon won the first encounter but lost the last. As the Oregon men have been steadily improving, making a fewer number of errors in each game played, it is probable that the Webfoots will win one game at least of the series.

If the Oregon ball club loses one game it will still have an excellent chance to win the Pacific northwest conference by defeating O. A. C. next Tuesday and if it loses both encounters it still has a chance to go into a tie with the Huskies.

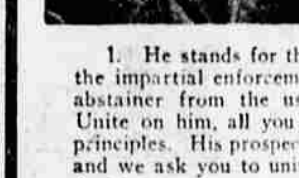
