Smith candidate was leading and a Walsh man was second. The same situation prevailed in the second district where the third district a Walsh candidate was leading with a Smith candidate closely second.

Sam A. Koser, secretary of state was high man among the Hoover delegates on the Republican ticket, former United States Senator R. N. Stanford was among the seven Republican delegates at large chosen. L. E. Sandblast who favored a declaration by the Republican party for government liquor control ran behind. D. R. Keasey who had declared for London also fell behind. Fred E. Kiddle of Island City, Hoover's Oregon campaign manager was not among the first seven on returns available tonight.

Precincts Are Reduced
Consolidation of precincts in Multnomah county through use of voting machines reduced the official number from 532 in the county to 473, leaving the total in the state 1783.

AL SMITH HAS 9619 LEAD
Governor has 15,238 votes to 5519 for Senator Reed

PORTLAND, Ore., May 19.—(AP)—Returns from all but 23 scattered precincts in Oregon's primary election gave Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York a lead of 9619 votes over Senator James A. Reed of Missouri for Oregon's endorsement for Democratic nomination for president. Smith had 55,128 votes and Reed received 5319. Senator Thomas J. Walsh of Montana who had withdrawn from the field, received 9553 votes.

Returns from 1636 precincts out of the 1783 in the state for the Republican nomination for president, gave 51,831 votes for Herbert Hoover here. The name of Frank O. Lowden of Illinois was written in by 559 voters.

STANFORD WINS AT NET

OREGON PLAYERS ELIMINATED IN SEMI-FINALS

SEATTLE, May 19.—(AP)—Stanford university made a clean sweep of the Pacific coast conference tennis tournament at the University of Washington today by capturing the singles and doubles events. The singles finals was an all-Stanford affair, the cardinals having eliminated Oregon in the semi-finals in the morning. Alan Herrington won the singles title by defeating Ralph McElvenny 6-5, 8-6 and 6-3.

Stanford won the doubles title when Herrington and McElvenny defeated Langlie and dNewkirk, Washington, 6-6, 7-5.

In the semi-finals McElvenny defeated Henry Neer, Oregon, 10-8, 6-1 and Herrington won from Howard Shaw, Oregon, 6-2, 8-4.

LIVES SNUFFED OUT BY MINE EXPLOSION

He that others would be brought out safely. Eighteen rescue crews were on the job.

Sixteen in Living Tomb
Shortly after the explosion rocked the district, the mine telephone in a shed near the shaft clicked. This line carried word to the surface from the living tomb. Tom Callaghan, a veteran miner, was on the inside and. He said: "I have 15 men with me. We are bratticed in my little coop some 300 feet back. We are getting some good air but we don't know how long it will last. Hurry."

The scene about the mine mouth was one of utter confusion. The entire population of the village rushed out as they felt the quake. Knowing the ways of mines they understood, realizing an explosion had swept the mine and endangered those within.

The mine officials said they did not know how many men were entombed. A check of the tag board at the entry showed 155 men were inside but miners said it was not a definite check, many men going to work in a hurry and forgetting to hang out their tags.

Five Have Narrow Escape
The live men who were rescued had just entered the mine. They were lowered in the cage to the main entry. As they stepped from the elevator a gust of wind gave warning of the coming explosion. Then came the shock of the blast. Luckily they were near the bottom of the shaft and the first rescue crew brought them out.

Volunteer rescuers from all parts of the Greene, Fayette and Washington coal fields rushed to Mather as did the trained crews of the United States bureau of mines from Pittsburg. The bureau men went by truck and a rescue car was ordered from Nant-Y-Glo.

The mine is owned by the Mather Collieries company. C. A. Bowler, assistant superintendent, told newspapermen that he did not know how many men were trapped. The cause of the blast was undetermined.

At the Waynesburg hospital, it was said that the five men brought there were in critical condition. They were unconscious and doctors and nurses were struggling to maintain the spark of life with oxygen.

MORE PLANTS REQUIRED

DURANT LETS CONTRACT FOR HUGE EXTENSION

A contract for a \$750,000 extension to the Lansing, Mich., Durant plant was recently placed by Durant Motors, Inc., according to word received by Norman De aux, general manager of the Pacific coast Durant factory. This extension was necessitated by the huge file of orders for Durant cars in the east, and it will increase the capacity of the Lansing plant to 1000 a day.

The advice states that work on the extension will begin immediately, and that the plant will be in full operation by August 1. At present the machine shops of the Lansing plant are working on a

twenty-four hour schedule, machining malleable castings and forgings for use in the factory here and the Durant factory in Elizabeth, N. J.

Chicago and Cook county, Illinois, registration figures show that the Durant-Star scored the largest percentage of gain for the first quarter of 1928 of any car selling there. Durant-Star gained 196 per cent over the corresponding period of 1927. The increase is partially attributed to the introduction at show time of the Durant sixes.
