HENRY NEER MAY TAKE
TRIP EAST IN SUMMER

Decision to Be Made Today for Oregon Net Star

A petition to send Henry Neer, University of Oregon No. 1 tennis player, to the national intercollegiate tournament which will be staged at Haverford, Pa., June 25, will go before the athletic committee today. Edward F. Abercrombie, stated yesterday.

Although Neer reached only the semi-finals in the Pacific coast tennis tourney held at Seattle last Friday and Saturday, he should be able to gain national rating if he takes the trip east, according to Abercrombie. Neer in the last two years of varsity tennis has made a good record. He defeated Harrington, winner of the Pacific coast singles title this year, in a tournament held at Stanford last month.

Neer defeated Macelvaney, captain of the California tennis team, last year but lost to him on the southern trip. In the recent tourney held at Seattle Neer was eliminated by Harrington after a hard fought match. This places Neer on an almost equal footing with the California stars and if he had been able to practice as often as the southern players, who enjoy sunshine for a good share of the season, he would be able to hold his own, Abercrombie stated.

Two additional offers to play in tourneys have been offered to the Webfoot southern star. One at Baltimore, Maryland on June 11 to 15, in the Baltimore Country club court for the Maryland state championship. The other offer is from the Delaware Country club at Wilmington on June 18 to 23.

learned well in the war, the cry of "poison gas" arose.

Wild panic seized them, and as the news spread the entire section of the city became terror stricken. He in the fields from their feet and dropped them dead as though poisoned.

Other persons in its path dropped right and left. A shift of wind carried it toward a pleasure resort where scores of promenaders were caught unknowing in its path and dropped in terrible agony.

There were men and women and children among these, bent on a good time in the bright morning sunshine, and among them a wedding party. Nobody knew why, but the festive food set before the guests suddenly became repugnant. The next moment some of them fell unconscious from their chairs. From other persons, who remembered perhaps the lessons Police appeared and put a cordon around the district, herding the populace into nearby emigrant sheds only with great difficulty.

The Manhattan Players will make the Heilig theatre their home until fall. They have been called runners-up for the famous Duffy players of Portland and San Francisco fame.

While no straining of the imagination could place them in that particularly skilled category, the fact remains that they have some players who are good at character parts; that they are sincere in their efforts to place interesting and light entertainment before their audiences; that they play go off snappily and minus any hitches; and that they have possibilities for developing into a real attraction.

Last night's play, "One Dollar a Week," was a laughable and all-around picture of the average struggling American family working its fingers to the bone to provide itself with modern advancements such as radio, phonograph, "cheerfield," a new dining room rug, etc., all on \$79 a week. Thirty-two of which went to the various furnishing houses for dollar-a-week payments, leaving a family of four the meager sum of \$40 per week for rent, clothing and food and savings. 88 DEGREES HIGHEST SINCE AUGUST 18

Sunday was the warmest day since August 18, 1927, according to records of Gerard de Brockport government weather observer. On August 18, the thermometer reached a high mark of 91 degrees and Sunday it went to 88, only three degrees lower.

The warmest day in May last year was one degree cooler than Sunday, the highest temperature being 87 degrees, recorded on May 14 when the mercury climbed to 87 degrees. Yesterday, the maximum yesterday being only 75 degrees.

Hod-carriers were on strike yesterday because they were not being paid the union wage. The union wage for this work is \$7 per day.

The plasterers walked off the job because they refused to take plaster from non-union hod-carriers. It was announced last night following the meeting of the executive boards that the plasterers would report for work this morning and would stay on the job until an agreement has been reached.
